PRESIDENT'S REPORT

IAN WILLANS

It has been a significant year for Badminton New Zealand. Even with the continuing challenges of COVID-19 we have enjoyed even more growth as an organisation and as a sport. This comes down to the great people we have in our badminton community and the passion they have for growing our game at all levels. Badminton New Zealand has made continued progress in 2021 as we strive to meet the changing needs and challenges of the current environment. I am pleased to see the can-do attitude of our team and wider community to meet these challenges and find ways to continue participating and enjoying badminton across New Zealand.

People are at the heart of what we do at Badminton New Zealand and it has been pleasing to see the impact being made at multiple levels of our badminton community. From our Badminton New Zealand Board and staff, through to our Associations and their clubs, schools and community groups, badminton is fortunate to have a strong backbone of good, capable people delivering badminton. Badminton continues to boom around New Zealand, and this is largely due to the work Associations are achieving in partnership with national, regional and local stakeholders that are passionate about supporting sport.

The demand for badminton is high and this consistently challenges us to think outside the box and come up with innovative solutions. A fantastic example of this is the continued growth of badminton at the secondary school level. Despite a number of distractions and cancellations, it was fantastic to see participation in secondary school badminton grow again in 2021 to take badminton to the 7th most participated school sport in the country – moving past athletics and touch on the way. This shows the team at Badminton New Zealand working through events, development, community and performance to achieve these results through our partnerships with Associations.

Although we have not been able to compete internationally in 2021, we remain closely connected to the Badminton World Federation (BWF) and continue to enjoy an incredibly supportive partnership with our world body. This is particularly important as we look to the exciting future of hosting the BWF World Junior Championships in 2024 and the BWF World Senior Championships in 2025. Hosting these large global sporting events back-to-back will be a fantastic challenge for Badminton New Zealand and our community to rise to.

Without a diverse collection of partners, Badminton New Zealand would not be able to achieve the impressive outcomes of the last year. I would like to especially thank Sport New Zealand for their continued investment that is critical in meeting the growing demand for participation options in badminton. It is also important to recognise and thank Peter Thompson and Barfoot & Thompson for their ongoing support and unwavering commitment to badminton.

2021 also saw significant change for the organisation with long time Chief Executive Joe Hitchcock stepping down. Stand out highlights for Badminton New Zealand during Joe's tenure include

securing more than \$2.8 million in investment to successfully bid for the BWF World Junior and BWF World Senior Championship events, launching the innovative Barfoot & Thompson New Zealand Badminton League played live in the SKYCITY Theatre, achieving sell-out crowds and a broadcast to more than 100 million households at the New Zealand Open, and growing government investment into badminton by 226%. New Zealand also won all six junior titles at an Oceania Badminton Championships for the first time in history and Badminton New Zealand, in conjunction with Barfoot & Thompson, won the Commercial Partnership of the Year Award at the recent New Zealand Sport and Recreation Awards. During his time at Badminton New Zealand, Joe was also the inaugural winner of the Future Leader Award and Scholarship and completed a Masters of Sport Management with Distinction through Massey University. On behalf of the Board of Badminton New Zealand and the entire badminton community, I would like to sincerely thank Joe for his contribution to badminton and wish him all the best for the exciting ventures ahead.

Finally, I would like to thank the Board of Badminton New Zealand and our Chair John Moody who has done an outstanding job in leading the governance of our organisation. A special thank you to Delwyn Cooper who will end her term on the Board of Badminton New Zealand at the AGM in 2022. Delwyn has done so much for badminton across New Zealand and her special way with people and ability to get things done was a huge asset to the organisation. Delwyn spent 11 years volunteering as a key board member for Badminton New Zealand and made an outstanding contribution during this time. I would also like to thank the Badminton New Zealand staff who work extremely hard to ensure everything they do contributes to positive badminton experiences that kiwis will love. And lastly, thank you also to our twenty-five member Associations who do so much every day to make badminton happen across all communities in New Zealand. The future continues to be bright for badminton and I look forward to continuing to work with all of our partners to inspire Kiwis to love badminton for life.



CHAIR'S REPORT

On behalf of the Board, it is my pleasure to report on Badminton New Zealand's activities in 2021.

The pandemic, and related Government restrictions, have created another very challenging year for us here at Badminton New Zealand. However, as we now enter the 2022 year, the country is on its way to focusing on living with this virus. The Board looks forward to the focus shifting once again to growing and developing our sport, as the wider environment begins to normalise.

Despite the pandemic and the disruption that occurred, particularly in the second half of 2021, the organisation has much to be proud of when we look back over the year, and we continue to positively impact on badminton in New Zealand. The organisation continued to deliver core programmes such as Shuttle Time, Coach Development and regional and national events, while new events were developed and improved such as the NZ Badminton League. Although the various event and programme cancellations have caused frustration, we are focused on what we can control and look forward to restrictions easing and having our players back competing.

Covid has delayed work on many aspects of our strategic plan. That said, we continue to make progress under our strategic pillars of Leadership, Play To Perform, and Engaged Communities. Recent news from Sport NZ that badminton will be a sport eligible for Strengthen & Adapt funding gives us an opportunity to relook at some aspects of our strategic plan. It also will provide a chance to make further changes as the sport adapts to this new post-Covid environment and we remain future focused. We are also excited about the roll out of other parts of our strategy over the next few years, including para and air badminton, and are hopeful we can conclude the Governance Mark work with Sport New Zealand in the coming months.

One of the most positive achievements during 2021 was the confirmation that badminton would receive high performance funding as an Aspirational Sport out to 2024. It has been over 10 years since badminton has been a recipient of this funding and coupled with our work with the New Zealand Olympic Committee, this should provide greater pathways for our athletes as we aim to get more individuals competing regularly on the world stage.

Another pleasing aspect was Badminton New Zealand's success at the New Zealand Sport & Recreation Awards, where the organisation was the recipient of the Commercial Partnership award with Barfoot & Thompson. The relationship with Barfoot & Thompson is key for the organisation, and it was fantastic to see this relationship recognised on a national stage.

FINANCIAL RESULT

The 2021 financial year felt very similar to the 2020 result, with significant challenges to navigate as the pandemic impacted on the delivery of key events, including our flagship New Zealand Open and a number of significant national events. As a result, there was a small operating deficit for the year of \$36,514.

The Board are very focused on presenting an improved position to stakeholders in 2022 as the environment normalises.

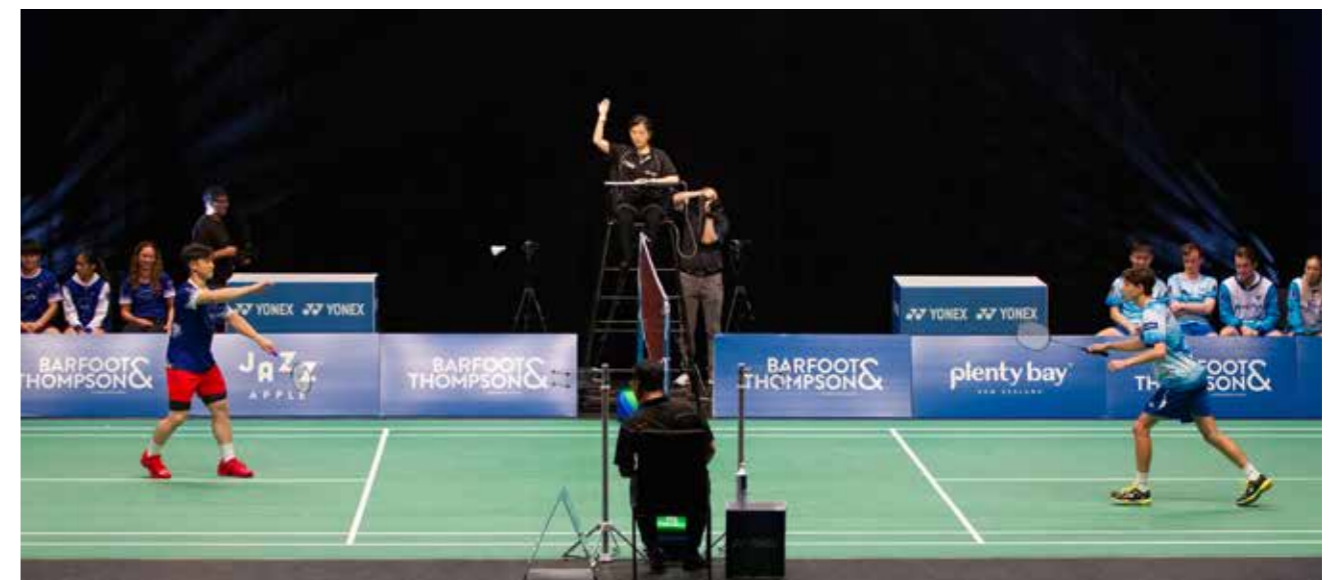

We are fortunate to have Stephen, and the Board looks forward to Stephen and his team continuing to take the game to a new level.

The Board has a diverse and knowledgeable governance team, and we were lucky to welcome Susannah Leydon-Davis to the Board during 2021, who replaced outgoing Chair Hetty Van Hale. My thanks to the Board for the many volunteer hours they have provided to the organisation, the level of strategic debate, and the respectful discussions throughout the year.

The future for badminton remains bright and the Board looks forward to inspiring even more Kiwis to love badminton for life.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

JOE HITCHCOCK

I am pleased to report on the significant achievements for Badminton New Zealand during another challenging year.. Although continually impacted by COVID-19 it has been a productive year with a number of enhanced initiatives taking shape and delivering increased value to our badminton community. We continue to build on our mission of inspiring Kiwis to love badminton for life through building stronger badminton communities, getting more people playing badminton and striving for better badminton performances. We would not be able to achieve this progress without the support of our valued partners and stakeholders.

Last year saw significant progress in building stronger badminton communities through the work of our twenty-five Associations and a number of key community partners. Increasing the capability and capacity of organisations ensures participants access the best possible badminton experiences. 2021 was the final year for our fantastic Community Manager Brent Miller as he relocated to Melbourne in early 2022. Brent has done an amazing job in his role over the last three years, and through his involvement in our performance coaching space over the last six years. Brent will leave huge shoes to fill as he has done so much not only for Badminton New Zealand, but for the Associations he has worked closely with and the wider badminton community and players across New Zealand.

Badminton continues to boom with increasing demand for opportunities. We are fortunate to be in this position as a number of sports in New Zealand decline in participation numbers. It is fantastic to see the increase reflected through the New Zealand Secondary School Sport Census participation numbers and this points to a positive future ahead. As more and more Kiwis are inspired to participate in badminton it is important that we ensure a strong pathway is in place to encourage opportunities at every level. In this we are proud of the steps we are taking to lead and deliver more in the diversity space with Michelle Au moving into managing this area specifically. Michelle takes responsibility for the organisation's focus on para badminton, diverse communities and Asian engagement, girls and gender equity initiatives and is already achieving great outcomes in this space.

Badminton New Zealand changed our staff and structure to better position the organisation for continued success. This follows the new strategic plan, the changing landscape due to the COVID-19 pandemic and my resignation from the organisation after eight fantastic years. These changes will help future-proof the organisation. Key to the change in Badminton New Zealand's structure is the newly created General Manager role that will oversee the operational planning, monitoring and reporting functions of the organisation's deliverables with key stakeholders. It will ensure high-quality delivery is maintained and that the organisation is better aligned to achieve outcomes for the community. It will also provide a better opportunity for the new Chief Executive to focus on Badminton New Zealand's strategy, external opportunities and continuing the growth of impact of

the organisation. Donna Trow stepped into the General Manager role from the 1st October 2021 and Badminton New Zealand is delighted that she will extend her management skills into this important new role. I would also like to specially mention and thank Donna for the outstanding role she played as interim Chief Executive through October 2021 to February 2022. Her incredible work-ethic and leadership were critical for Badminton New Zealand during a challenging time and for that I sincerely thank her.

I would also like to thank the team at Badminton New Zealand - Brent, Colleen, Donna, Jonathon, Michelle, Sam and Rikke who go above and beyond for the organisation and have made every day enjoyable. They are all leaders in their own right and I'm looking forward to following their careers as they continue to achieve and succeed. I would also like to thank the Board of Badminton New Zealand and Chairs that I have been fortunate to learn from and work with. Thank you to John Moody who has stepped into the Chairperson role and has already done such an impressive job. The organisation is in very good hands with John's governance and his fantastic experience and expertise. A huge thank you to our current Badminton New Zealand President Ian Willans and Badminton New Zealand Board Member and BWF Council Member Nigel Skelt. Both Ian and Nigel have been a foundation of support with their time and experience through the ups and downs of leading the organisation. And finally a special mention to Delwyn Cooper, a long-standing Badminton New Zealand Board Member who is finishing her term in 2022 after 11 years of service. Delwyn is an absolute legend in the badminton community who has made an incredible contribution to our sport. She is always there for a chat, a laugh and some good practical advice and I thank her for all her support of Badminton New Zealand and for the sport as a whole.

Badminton New Zealand is well positioned across all areas to continue to inspire Kiwis to love badminton for life. I am excited to see what is next for the organisation and the sport as it continues to innovate and thrive.



PROGRAMMES

COMMUNITY

Shuttle Time:

The 2021 season began extremely strongly, with both participation and coach development numbers tracking towards a record setting season. By mid-year our twenty-five Associations had trained a record 151 Shuttle Time Teachers / Student Youth Leaders and delivered Shuttle Time experiences to 19,741 unique individuals. Unfortunately, an increase in COVID-19 disruption slowed this significant progress with no further coach development able to be offered in the second half of the season. Fortunately, with a can-do attitude, Associations continued to deliver Shuttle Time opportunities for our young people, with New Zealand recording the highest participation numbers throughout Oceania, with 37,241 individuals gaining the opportunity to participate in 4,696 Shuttle Time sessions.

A focus in 2021 was increasing the emphasis on coach development, in particular on increasing the number of coaches trained in Shuttle Time. A secondary focus was to provide continuous development opportunities post-qualification, thereby maximising the impact of our coaches in our communities. A few of the highlights for 2021 include;

- The delivery of 23 Shuttle Time courses (up from 13 in 2020).
- Shuttle Time games and a coach development session delivered at the Badminton New Zealand National Workforce Conference.
- Games workshop pilot delivered by Badminton Manawatū to their Shuttle Time trained coaches.
- Collaboration with Sport Tasman in a pilot programme to train students to deliver badminton opportunities in school settings.
- Collaboration with Special Olympics New Zealand to provide coach education opportunities to their regional workforce.

Associations:

In addition to the Shuttle Time and Coaching component of the Community role, a significant focus in 2021 was expanding our Association support. One of the key mechanisms for this support was Voice of the Participant, with Badminton New Zealand leading this important opportunity to improve our insights. Partnering with seven Associations, we connected with 1,009 players, half of whom were rangatahi. The findings were clear - our community has strong satisfaction levels for the currently delivered programmes, however they noted that three main points would improve their experience:

- More Competitions – 22%
- More Coaching – 17%
- Better Facilities – 10%

Badminton New Zealand will now work with each of these Associations over the coming 12 months to establish how best to address these findings.

Partnering with the Wellington Associations, Badminton New Zealand also supported the continuation of the Wellington Capital Strategy. In 2021, the strategy entered the delivery phase with region-wide Open Days putting racquets in the hands of hundreds of people for the first time. Turning towards 2022, the region now seeks to address capability and capacity shortages in both coaching and event delivery. Badminton New Zealand is excited to see this project progress and with it the continued growth of badminton across the Wellington Region.

COACH EDUCATION - BWF LEVEL 1

The globally recognised BWF Level 1 Coach Education Course is Badminton New Zealand's platform to develop identified Association coaches to deliver quality coaching experiences for players. Again, COVID-19 disrupted this course with the second weekend unable to take place, therefore all twenty-one candidates are required to fulfil the second weekend in 2022, along with the candidates who were unable to complete the second weekend in 2020.

Thank you to our New Zealand BWF Level 1 Tutors – Chris Bright and Ritchie Marr for their quality planning and delivery of the first weekend of the course and to Badminton Oceania for their support throughout the courses. We are looking forward to having an abundance of qualified Level 1 coaches by the end of 2022.

REGIONAL COACH & PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

This year saw Badminton New Zealand develop and introduce Technical Coaching sessions for coaches throughout New Zealand. The purpose of these opportunities was to upskill club, secondary school and Association coaches on the technical aspects that are required to be a Level 1 Coach and to coach effectively at a club, secondary School and Association rep Level. Four sessions were delivered in 2021 - held in Palmerston North, Christchurch, Hamilton and Bay of Plenty.

The continued delivery of the Regional Coach & Player Development Camps has had a significant impact towards increasing the number, scope and capability of people involved in coach and player development programmes throughout New Zealand.

In 2021 Badminton New Zealand introduced the Northern Region to this programme, comprising of the following Associations; Bay of Plenty, Waikato, and Counties Manukau.

In the Central and Mainland Regions, the planning and implementation of these programmes is now being led and delivered by the established regional groups, with Badminton New Zealand providing coach development support annually, as well as providing an opportunity through the delivery of the Combined Coach and Player Development Camp, which was held on the 5th and 6th of June in Wellington.

This opportunity allowed coaches from the Northern Group, the Central Region and the Mainland Region to connect, share coaching experiences and receive coach mentoring from Badminton New Zealand Performance Coaches Rikke Olsen Siegemund and Brent Miller. It was also a good opportunity for the players from these regions to train and play at a higher level.

PERFORMANCE

It has been another incredibly challenging year for our Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme with the continued challenges and impacts of the pandemic bearing down on our plans.

We have a group of younger players where the focus for the past 18 months has been working hard towards an overseas opportunity and each time we have begun the planning and implementation process, we have unfortunately been challenged and forced by the pandemic to adapt and make new plans.

Despite the pandemic, there were three performance players who managed to compete in international tournaments in 2021. Mixed Doubles Pair Oliver Leydon-Davis and Anona Pak are our highest ranked pair, with a BWF World Ranking of 56. The next step for Oliver and Anona is for them to try and qualify for the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham.

For the past two years a pathway has been created where our best outgoing New Zealand U19 Squad Members get an opportunity to join the NZ Development Squad and NZ National Squad trainings for a trial period of six months. This transition period has been successful, and we are seeing more and more young players committing to the process and gaining an understanding around the next steps on the Badminton New Zealand performance pathway.

There have been a few changes during the year in our NZ National Squad and NZ Development Squads as a few players have chosen to not be a part of the programme for personal reasons. Currently we have 4 NZ National Squad players, 9 NZ Development Squad players and 5 players in the trial group. We also have Ricky Cheng, Jack Wang and Roanne Apalisok joining in on our trainings. There haven't been any reselections in 2021 due to the lockdowns and no international tournaments being played. Reselection of all Squads will be on the 20th of May 2022. The structure will change a bit over the coming years as we aim to develop more clarity around our purpose, expectations, and explore how we best prioritise and support our players to achieve to their best potential.

Throughout 2021, all players have received ongoing individual meetings in person or through an online platform. At these meetings we review and evaluate the last period and discuss changes required for the next period. Specific content of these meetings can include; their weekly plans, tournament plan, their SMART (development goals), their short and long-term goals and what they must be aware of to reach them. We would like to thank the players for the effort and commitment they put into these meetings, it has been great getting to know them more and seeing how they have all dealt with the challenges of the pandemic.

We would like to thank Tony Griffen for all the time, effort and support he has given to Rikke and the players since 2019. For now, Tony has decided to step away from the programme, but we look forward to seeing him back in not the too distant future.

Taking the programme forward, we believe that the next two important steps in our development are to get the players overseas to compete, and to start working more intensely on their game plans, which includes video analysis. There has been significant progress made regarding the development of game plans as we currently have Bjorn Siegemund helping with some video analysis for our players who are playing international tournaments.

We ended 2021 with a successful application to the High Performance Sport New Zealand Aspirational Fund. The purpose of this fund is targeted at building relationships with other high performance sports. High Performance Sport New Zealand are working with Badminton New Zealand around identification and development within the pathway.

We sincerely hope 2022 will be the year where we can start travelling again, build on our World Rankings and where Badminton New Zealand can deliver international tournaments so that we can give our players some meaningful opportunities in which they can get the international exposure that is needed to reach the next level.

PARA BADMINTON

Para badminton continues to make big steps nationally and internationally, with the incredible debut of badminton at the 2021 Tokyo Paralympics. The pathway from community to performance has increased in opportunities, and in return, more para-athletes are participating in our sport. Regional Open Days continue to be a successful introductory opportunity, to work with Associations in bringing new people into para badminton.

In 2021, the following Open Days were held;

Our Development athletes also continued to attend our Training camps;

- Wheelchair Classes Training & Event: 26-27th June, Christchurch

In addition, a Wheelchair Singles and Doubles event was held in Christchurch with eight participants. Our team was also busy planning for the SKY SPORT NZ Invitational Para Badminton Cup, initially scheduled for November. Unfortunately, the border restrictions made the event unfeasible to be held, but we thank Sky Sport for their support of our para events.

Badminton New Zealand continues to value its relationships with Paralympics New Zealand, the Halberg Foundation and Parafeds across the country. The support provided regionally and nationally is vital to the development of our para badminton programme.

Lastly, under the Badminton New Zealand restructure, a Diversity and Inclusion Manager role was created with para badminton as a key focus area. Michelle Au stepped into the role and has since undertaken a SWOT analysis of the para badminton programme and initiated a new framework from 2022 onwards. She continues to work alongside the coaching team of Kenneth Yew, Josh Curry and Marianne Loh.

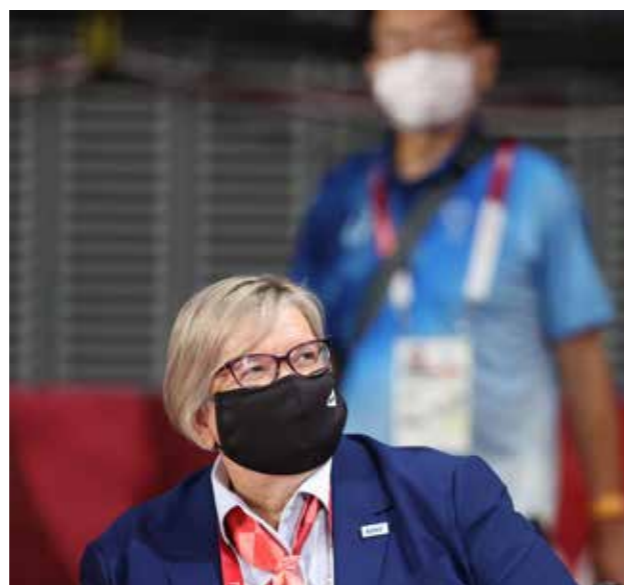

Notes to the Financial Statements

Badminton New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 31 December 2021

1. Reporting Entity

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is subject to the provisions of the Act. The financial statements are a special purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies below.

These financial statements have not been prepared for external use. They are prepared for governance purposes only and should not be relied on for any other purpose.

The comparative figures provided in the financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2020.

2. Statement of Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Measurement Base

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grants (including Sport New Zealand) and sponsorship are recognised when the conditions attached to the grants have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions. Until any such obligations have been met, any grants or sponsorship received in cash are shown as income in advance.

Membership Levies are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Entry Fees (including New Zealand Open) and Player Contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Goods and Services received in kind are not recorded as revenue.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined on a first-in-first-out basis, and net realisable value.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of fixed assets is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.



Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

Employee Entitlements

Provision has been made for the organisation's liability for annual leave. The annual leave has been calculated on an actual entitlement basis at current rates of pay. This equates to the cash amount necessary to settle the obligation as at balance date.

Income Tax

The organisation is an amateur sports promoter and is exempt from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and Services Tax

All amounts are stated exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Opinion

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of Badminton New Zealand Incorporated (the Society) on pages 4 to 10, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December 2021, the income statement and statement of changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes to the special purpose financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying special purpose financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Society as at 31 December 2021, and its financial performance the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies as disclosed in Note 2 of the special purpose financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

We draw attention to Note 1 to the special purpose financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The special purpose financial statements are prepared for governance purposes only. As a result, the special purpose financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the Society and should not be distributed to parties other than the Society and its members. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of Those Charged with Governance for the Special Purpose Financial Statements

Those charged with governance are responsible on behalf of the Society for the preparation of the special purpose financial statements in accordance with the accounting policies as disclosed in Note 2 of the special purpose financial statements and for such internal control as those charged with governance determine is necessary to enable the preparation of special purpose financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



In preparing the financial statements, those charged with governance are responsible for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless those charged with governance either intend to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Special Purpose Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the special purpose financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (NZ) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the decisions of users taken on the basis of these special purpose financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs (NZ), we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the special purpose financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the special purpose financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the special purpose financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

The title 'Partner' conveys that the person is a senior member within their respective division, and is among the group of persons who hold an equity interest (shareholder) in its parent entity, Findex Group Limited. The only professional service offering which is conducted by a partnership is external audit, conducted via the Crowe Australasia external audit division and Unison SMSF Audit. All other professional services offered by Findex Group Limited are conducted by a privately owned organisation and/or its subsidiaries.

Our audit has been undertaken so that we might state to the Incorporated Society's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. THE BOARD'S FOCUS

- Board succession planning.
- Support for management and staff with navigating the disruption of the wider COVID-19 environment, funding initiatives, and high performance pathways.
- Continuation of the board Intern programme.

BOARD COMPOSITION

The Board is comprised of four elected members (one of whom is the President) and three appointed members. During the period:

- John Moody (Chair) was appointed for a further 3 year term
- Susannah Leydon-Davis was elected for an initial 3 year term, replacing Hetty Van Hale

COST OF GOVERNANCE

Board related costs for 2021 were \$4251 compared with \$8201 in 2020. Board costs in 2021 continued to remain at a low level, owing to the reduced number of face-to-face meetings as a result of COVID-19. We expect the Board to continue with a hybrid meeting model for the foreseeable future.
