# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

## IAN WILLANS

The past year has been a mixed bag for Badminton New Zealand. It has been great to see the resurgence of badminton across the country and the willingness of Associations and players to adapt for the good of the game, as some Covid restrictions disappeared and others lingered, however, at the same time, Badminton New Zealand has faced challenges as the impact of the past two years and rising costs began to flow through.

I would like to acknowledge the board members, Stephen and the staff, and all of our Associations for their resilience through these difficult years and their commitment to get badminton back up and running as quickly as possible, for as many as possible, throughout the year. Badminton is fortunate to have good, capable people delivering badminton around the country and I am confident that we have the right people in place to meet the current challenges and continue to grow our sport.

Board Chair John Moody stepped down at the conclusion of 2022 and his leadership and insight will be missed. Thank you John for the positive impact and steady leadership you have offered to Badminton New Zealand for many years.

These challenges have really highlighted the importance of engaging with everyone and working together to ensure our solutions are 'fit for purpose' and serve the needs of our players. In that regard, it is exciting to see the work being done towards a whole-of-sport member management system, with the support of Sport New Zealand's Strengthen and Adapt fund. Alongside streamlining the administration of badminton, I anticipate that the improved connection to players through this project will deliver significant and useful insights, that will aid Badminton New Zealand and the Member Associations to better design their programmes and events to meet the needs of players.

In 2022, we embarked on the process of developing a new strategic plan, which will guide Badminton New Zealand for the next four years. The 2023-2026 strategic plan will see a big focus on building stronger foundations for badminton, through developing our community and our people, so that we have a strong platform for sustainable growth into the future. We greatly appreciate the engagement and contributions of the board, staff, and associations to help develop this important piece of work.

Sadly, 2022 also saw the passing of Life Member Jeff Robson (MBE). Jeff (frequently known as "Mr Badminton") had a long and distinguished career as a badminton administrator and player and will be sorely missed by the badminton community after his lifetime of service to the sport worldwide.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the support of our key partners – our twenty-five Member Associations, Sport New Zealand, High Performance Sport New Zealand, Badminton Oceania, and the Badminton World Federation. As we turn the corner towards growing badminton again post-Covid, we are very fortunate to work with these organisations to make badminton accessible to all. I look forward to seeing what 2023 brings.



# BOARD CHAIRS' & CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

2022 has been a challenging year for Badminton New Zealand and we were faced with making some major decisions for our future. These strategic decisions also had to be made in the context of facing operational challenges such as rising costs, which have arisen off the back of the Covid years.

2022 has also been a year of change with a new CE starting and by the end of the year we had a new (interim) Board Chair as well. Because of this we have moved to a combined CE/ Board Chair Report, which was an idea that was being contemplated anyway. This year the Chair and CE reports are combined as alignment exists between the Board and the Badminton New Zealand team. The board encourages an open relationship with our Member Associations and will continue to work to strengthen this relationship in the future. Although there were some challenges with this in 2022, there were also some great examples of unity and working together.

From a "badminton on the court" perspective it was fantastic to finally get through a full season of competition with Inter Association, tournaments and other leagues being completed successfully in almost all instances. Even better was the strong demand for events, which saw record entries in many cases. It was just great to see so many players back on court, competing and enjoying the sport in relative freedom once again. Covid did rear its ugly head a few times and impacted some events, but in general it has been a great season on the court.

As 2022 unfolded, the two biggest challenges that Badminton New Zealand faced was its difficult financial position and the need to make decisions around the future of major events. The financial result was not at all good and can partly be attributed to one off factors such as the unfortunate and very late withdrawal from the Thomas Cup, due to Covid. This meant we incurred some significant extra costs that had not been anticipated. However, what has also been made clear is that the ongoing sustainability of our programmes is also under threat. In the short term this will mean we have to reduce costs, which will mean we reduce what we deliver through our various performance, development and para programmes, as well as carefully managing all other expenses. Badminton New Zealand cannot afford to incur another year of losses in 2023 and so we face the short-term challenge of cutting costs and programmes, while also working on longer term solutions to ensure we can continue to grow the sport in New Zealand. Ultimately Badminton New Zealand must place itself in a financial position where it has solid reserves and can confidently deliver a surplus position each year while also delivering to our community by way of support and programmes.

Part of the "fix" for all this is to build a national member management system and then link that to a revenue development plan. And the good news here during the year was that Badminton New Zealand was successful at securing funding for these projects under Sport New Zealand's "Strengthen and Adapt" programme. This will see Badminton New Zealand receive new funding streams to do this work from 2023 onwards. The even better news is that the member

management system will also provide direct benefits to Member Associations and their Clubs, as they will be able to utilise this system.

Other positive pieces of work from 2022 include the review and revision of Badminton New Zealand's Strategic Plan. This was completed in conjunction with the Board, Badminton New Zealand team and also had input from Associations. As with any work on strategy there will always be a variety of views on what is the best path to take, but now that the strategic path has been agreed and determined, we look forward to the whole badminton community getting behind this.

The Hui in November in Wellington was a great example of Associations coming together to discuss and agree on a unified position on a variety of topics. This was achieved with the Strategic Plan for 2023 onwards and there was also some great progress made on developing a new model for Affiliation Fees. The Hui was also the first time in a long while that many of our Associations had been able to come together and it was great to be connecting again, and in person. Badminton New Zealand will continue to provide opportunities to come together in 2023 and by doing this we hope that we can continue to build an even more collaborative and connected community.

Ultimately it is people that make everything happen and even faced with some challenges this year, we have seen many people rise to the occasion and work towards a result that is "best for badminton overall". The team at Badminton New Zealand are integral to our success and are the group of people that help link Associations, the Board, and external stakeholders together. A massive thanks to Donna, Colleen, Sam, Rikke, Jono, Michelle and Justine for their very hard mahi during the year. Thanks as well to the Board for their work during the year. There were some tricky decisions to be made and the Board stuck with these until conclusions were reached, so thank you to Danny, Christina, Nigel, Ian, Susannah and Simon for their respective contributions around the Board table. As well as our key commercial partners, it has been great to see the relationships with Sport New Zealand, High Performance Sport New Zealand and Badminton Oceania deepen during 2022.

The final thanks though needs to go to the many, many people involved in our Member Associations. This group of people contribute so much to the sport and the passion that is frequently displayed is amazing. The team at Badminton New Zealand feel very well supported by Associations and are excited about the opportunities that exist in 2023 and beyond to all work even more closely together.





# PROGRAMMES

## COMMUNITY:

A highlight of 2022 was having the opportunity to visit 19 of our Associations to assist them to elevate the delivery of badminton locally, be it through supporting event delivery, assisting with Shuttle Time courses, organising software upskilling, or simply planning for the future. Of note, was the outstanding step forwards that we've seen in Taranaki and Nelson this year, both of whom have renewed their focus on junior development with Nelson participating in the South Island Team Championships and Taranaki rapidly growing Under 13 delivery in New Plymouth.

### Shuttle Time

Shuttle Time began strongly in 2022 with Badminton New Zealand training eight new Shuttle Time Tutors with participants from across the North Island. A highlight of our new tutors was Duncan from Taranaki delivering the Associations first Teacher Course in three years, with nine new teachers qualified and now coaching tamariki throughout the region.

Delivery of Shuttle Time to participants returned to pre-Covid levels, with a massive 35,000 young people experiencing badminton through either in-school coaching, junior clubs, school competitions, open days or other programmes. Hutt Valley continued to lead the way with delivery to over 5,000 participants.

In March Badminton New Zealand launched and delivered Shuttle Time Gift Your Gear, which saw the collection of thousands of badminton items that have since been redistributed to schools, junior clubs and young players throughout the country. Badminton New Zealand would like to offer a special thank you to YONEX and our significant anonymous donor for contributing to the success of the initiative.

### Voice of the Participant

Voice of the Participant (VOP) entered its second year with 400 participants from Hawke's Bay, Manawatū, Otago, Southland and Taranaki sharing their feedback. As with most of the 2021 Associations, feedback highlighted that participants are satisfied with their Association, but desire 'More Competitions' and 'More Coaching' to improve their experience. The focus for these Associations will now switch to initiative design as they seek to continue elevating the participant experience.

Meanwhile 2021 VOP Associations of Bay of Plenty, Canterbury and the three Wellington Associations implemented or planned initiatives to address their communities feedback. Bay of Plenty began with a series of open days delivered to rangatahi throughout Rotorua, Tauranga and Whakātane. These open days resulted in record attendance at junior clubs throughout the region, and attention now turns to converting participants to regular players. Canterbury have developed a Girls in Badminton initiative that they will be delivering throughout 2023, with girls to be provided opportunities to try badminton at their school and then to join regular

fun-focused participation opportunities. In the Wellington Region, the focus was on identifying opportunities for Associations to collaborate together to provide greater opportunities to all players. Through the development of a shared calendar, local players will now have consistent opportunities to participate in events and programmes regardless of where they reside within the region.

## COACH EDUCATION - BWF LEVEL 1 & BWF LEVEL 2:

The globally recognised BWF Coach Education Level 1 is Badminton New Zealand's platform to develop identified Association coaches to deliver quality coaching experiences for players.

After a couple of Covid affected years, 2022 saw 21 coaches receive their BWF Level 1 Qualification. Congratulations to the following newly appointed BWF Level 1 coaches:

An Independent Advisor, Kyle McLean, was appointed to collect insights and findings to produce a comprehensive report to help shape and develop Badminton New Zealand's Coach Development Philosophy and Framework.

This newly developed philosophy and framework provides the operational and delivery scope for Badminton New Zealand's newly appointed Coach Development Manager – Tracey Hallam.

### A COMMUNITY OF CONNECTED COACHES SUPPORTED TO BE THEIR BEST

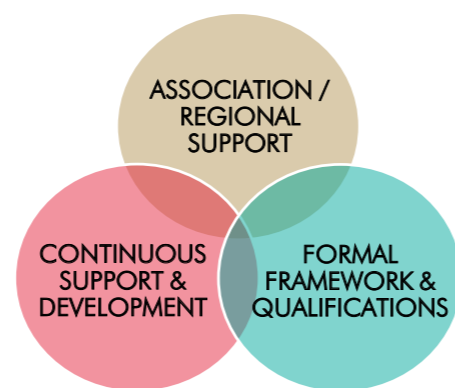
This philosophy is underpinned by the following values:

- Singles Tactical Session - Zones
- Introduction of Admin Play
- Discussion re the two biggest challenges coaches in your region are currently facing
- Presentation of the BNZ Coach Development Philosophy & Framework
- An open Question and Answer session

Presenters and coaches enjoyed the interactive nature of the session, and with the newly established Coach Development Manager role at Badminton New Zealand, we look forward to the continual development of these Regional Coaching Groups.

## BALANCE IS BETTER:

In 2022 a Balance is Better Advisory Group was formed. The purpose of the advisory group is to develop a badminton system that understands Balance Is Better philosophies and leads the implementation of relevant actions that ensures a balanced approach for all participants in all forms of badminton from community to performance.

The following priority areas have been identified as support and delivery areas in 2023:

- Parental support through the development and delivery of resources and workshops
- Identifying and communicating the role of the coach within the Balance is Better philosophy and framework
- Event changes to ensure quality experiences for all participants are placed front of mind

#### DIVERSITY & INCLUSION:

In 2022, Badminton New Zealand saw the addition of the Diversity & Inclusion space, which encompasses three main areas:

- Asian Engagement Project
- Para Badminton programme
- Women & Girls initiatives

#### Asian Engagement Project:

Badminton New Zealand has created a three-phase Asian Engagement Plan to highlight areas outside of participation, where Asian engagement can be improved. Previous insights have shown participation is typically Asian-saturated, but significantly decreased within governance, leadership, and staff roles. This data is consistent with the findings presented in Sport New Zealand's Diversity and Inclusion survey (2020) and Sport Waitakere's 'Barriers to Asian Participation of Formal Leadership in Community Sport' (2021) research.

Phase 1 of the plan focuses on gaining an understanding of the landscape across the badminton community and New Zealand.

#### Para Badminton:

The New Zealand Para badminton programme continues to develop, with more opportunities in the pathway, from a grassroots community to performance level. Highlights from 2022 include:

- Shuttle Time Inclusion Module delivered at the February Tutor & Teacher courses
- Three BWF Level 1 Coaches completing the BWF Disability Coaching Module
- First National Classification and inclusion of Para events at the National Championships
- Badminton sessions at three Regional Halberg Games

In addition, notable performances by New Zealanders on the international Para badminton circuit include:

- Oceania SL3 – SU5 Mixed Doubles Champions – Carrie Wilson / Oliver Linton
- Oceania SL4 Women's Singles finalist – Carrie Wilson
- Indonesia Para Badminton International – SL3-SL4 Men's Doubles Bronze – Wojtek Czyz



- BWF Para Badminton World Championships – SU5 Men’s Singles R16 – Thomas Slade
- BWF Para Badminton World Championships – SL4 Women’s Singles 3rd Group Stage – Carrie Wilson
- Three participants at the Dubai Para Badminton International

Badminton New Zealand is thankful for the support from Tātaki Auckland Unlimited, Paralympics New Zealand, Badminton Oceania & Badminton World Federation to enable many of these New Zealand Para badminton opportunities.

#### Women & Girls:

Aligning with Sport New Zealand’s Diversity & Inclusion strategy, Badminton New Zealand has taken steps to champion, promote and create opportunities for Women and Girls in badminton. Initial steps include;

- Development of a girls-only training programme
- Three staff members attended the IWG Women & Girls Conference, Tāmaki Makaurau
- Planning of female-specific educational webinar series

#### PERFORMANCE:

2022 was sadly another year that the pandemic impacted on the international exposure of the New Zealand Senior and Development Squads. We sent a large group of players to Melbourne to compete at the Oceania Championships. Unfortunately, we had 7 players that contracted COVID-19 before, during or after the tournament. However even with this number of players not being able to compete we managed to win two titles:

MS: Edward Lau

MD: Jack Wang / Abhinav Manota

The situation with players testing positive each day in Melbourne impacted on our attendance at the Thomas Cup Finals as we were forced to withdraw the team.

We had two players further competing overseas in 2022 - Anona Pak and Oliver Leydon-Davis. This pairing put in a lot of effort and commitment towards their Commonwealth Games Campaign, and this was rewarded when they successfully qualified for the CWG2022 in Birmingham. At the CWG they performed well in their first two matches winning in two straight games before losing to the Singapore pair who ended up winning the mixed doubles gold medal. This was also to be Oliver’s last international tournament. We thank him for his contribution to the sport and wish him well with his future endeavours.

Lastly on the international front we had a large group of players competing in the Sydney, Bendigo and North Harbour International Tournaments, which is the first step towards more international experience in 2023 for most of our players.

The New Zealand Senior and Development Squad trainings were setup similar to last year. There were six weekly New Zealand National Squad / New Zealand Development Squad sessions that were offered, and they were delivered by Tony Griffen and Rikke Olsen Siegemund.

# EVENTS

The 2022 season, on the surface, represented a return to business as usual for events across New Zealand. Under the surface, Badminton New Zealand and our Associations continued to grapple with rapidly changing conditions and requirements, with many adaptations made throughout the year to ensure our events went ahead and engaged as many players as possible.

As restrictions began easing at the start of the year, we were thrilled to deliver a one-off 'Summer Series' for our junior players, in particular those in Auckland, who had missed out on a lot of badminton at the end of 2021. These two events were about celebrating being back on court and having fun, with ice cream, spot prizes and music throughout. A special thanks to Counties Manukau and Waitakere for their support to make these events as accessible as possible to players.

It was pleasing to see a resurgence in the quantity and scale of Sanctioned Events taking place throughout the year, with 2544 players competing in 40 events around New Zealand. This represented a strong bounce-back from the covid-affected 2021 season, with 57% more participants, while also showing an increase from the pre-covid 2019 season. The 2022 season saw the introduction of Masters sanctioned events, and the NZ Tour – both of which proved successful.

The season also saw 160 teams take part in Inter-Association competitions across both islands. Restrictions at the start of the season contributed to a reduction in players and teams, however we expect participation to return quickly to previous levels. Congratulations to Wisden Cup winners North Harbour, Slazenger Cup winners Waikato, and to Nelson for earning promotion into the Wisden and Slazenger Cup competition for 2023.

For the first time in the past 3 years, we were able to run our entire programme of national events. It was a delight to reach into every corner of the country and provide meaningful competition to many demographics. The swell in entries indicates that badminton is alive and well in New Zealand, with the Senior National Championships receiving the largest entry ever.

It has been a difficult year for international competition, with the Oceania Championships moving out of New Zealand, along with the cancellation of the New Zealand Open and Manawatu International as the impact of border closures and uncertainty continued to be felt. The Victor North Harbour International however was a highlight of the year, providing some much-needed international competition for our players, and engaging many volunteers and officials in the delivery of the event.

Our events programme relies on the generous support of our partners, and we'd like to acknowledge Auckland Council, Christchurch City Council, Porirua City Council, Tauranga City Council, Queenstown Lakes District Council, Tātaki Auckland Unlimited, Sport Manawatu, Pelorus Trust and Pub Charity for their contributions. We also greatly appreciate the support of Yonex, Suzuki, Sal's Pizza and Massey University.



Finally, we would like to share our thanks and appreciation to our technical officials, the staff and volunteers in associations, and the teachers, team managers and coaches around the country who contribute so much to make badminton events possible. Thank you!



# TECHNICAL OFFICIALS

The 2022 season ended up being a big year for technical official development. The committee alongside BNZ staff delivered a series of online referee trainings (50 attendees), three in-person umpire trainings (40 attendees) and a line judge training (15 attendees).

Addressing the perennial shortage of referees in New Zealand was identified as key goal for 2022 with existing referees managing a heavy workload due to the shortages. We are incredibly proud of the development work undertaken throughout the year with 10 trainee referees progressing and now attempting to become qualified in 2023. Umpire numbers remain consistent and training opportunities delivered throughout 2022 will boost numbers in major centres. Meanwhile new committee member Lynne Dobson has lead a new training programme for line judges following the formalisation of the national line judge accreditation.

Finally, we would like to thank all of the committee members for their commitment for another action-packed year, in particular Kelvin Tsui who has been instrumental in the development of our umpires. Kelvin has resigned from the committee due to his recent move to Australia and we wish him all the best for his new adventure over the ditch.



# Notes to the Financial Statements

## Badminton New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 31 December 2022

### 1. Reporting Entity

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is subject to the provisions of the Act. The financial statements are a special purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies below.

These financial statements have not been prepared for external use. They are prepared for governance purposes only and should not be relied on for any other purpose.

The comparative figures provided in the financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2021.

### 2. Statement of Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

#### Measurement Base

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

#### Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

#### Comparative Information

Comparative information has been reclassified, where necessary, to achieve consistency in disclosure with the current year.

#### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grants (including Sport New Zealand) and sponsorship are recognised when the conditions attached to the grants have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions. Until any such obligations have been met, any grants or sponsorship received in cash are shown as income in advance.

Membership Levies are recognised over the period of the membership (usually 12 months). Amounts received in advance for memberships relating to future periods are recognised as a liability until such time that period covering the membership occurs.

Entry Fees (including New Zealand Open), and Player Contributions, are recognised in the period in which the respective event or competition takes place. Amounts received in advance of the event are recognised as a liability until such time that the event or competition occurs.

Goods and Services received in kind are not recorded as revenue.

#### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

#### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined on a first-in-first-out basis, and net realisable value.



### Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of fixed assets is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

### Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

### Holiday Pay Liability

Provision has been made for the organisation's liability for annual leave. The annual leave has been calculated on an actual entitlement basis at current rates of pay. This equates to the cash amount necessary to settle the obligation as at balance date.

### Income Tax

The organisation is an amateur sports promoter and is exempt from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

### Goods and Services Tax

All amounts are stated exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

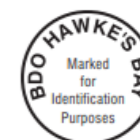

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF BADMINTON NEW ZEALAND INCORPORATED

### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Badminton New Zealand Incorporated ("the Federation"), which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December 2022, and the statement of profit or loss and statement of changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements of the Federation for the year ended 31 December 2022 are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies specified in Note 2 to the financial statements.

### Basis for Opinion

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, the Federation.

### Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution and Use

We draw attention to Note 2 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared solely for the Federation's Board, as a body. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the Federation and the Federation's Board, as a body, and should not be distributed to or used by parties other than the Federation or the Federation's Board. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

### Board's Responsibilities for the Financial Statements

The Board is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the accounting policies specified in Note 2 to the financial statements and for such internal control as the Board determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Board is responsible for assessing the Federation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board either intends to liquidate the Federation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

# GOVERNANCE REPORT

## THE BOARD'S FOCUS

The Board continued to focus on assisting with the setting of strategy and prioritising elements in the strategic plan. Identifying and mitigating risks that face the organisation, monitoring health and safety and guiding the performance of the Chief Executive were also key focus areas for the Board in 2022. The wellbeing of the staff of Badminton New Zealand was also prioritised.

The Board work plan in 2022 included:

- Continued use of Zoom for most Board meetings to help contain costs.
- Two face to face Board meetings were held, which allowed the reconnection of people.
- Completion of the Governance Mark.
- The induction of a new Chief Executive.
- Continuation of the Board Intern Programme.
- Determining if and how major events fitted in to the overall strategy.
- Support for management and staff with navigating further disruption arising from Covid-19.
- Collaborating with management and staff on the development of our Strengthen & Adapt plan.

## BOARD COMPOSITION

The Board is comprised of four elected members (one of whom is the President) and three appointed members. During the period:

- Delwyn Cooper retired from the Board having completed her maximum number of successive terms.
- There was no one elected at the AGM to fill the vacancy created by Delwyn Cooper concluding her terms.
- Simone Naylor was appointed until the next AGM to fill the elected member vacancy.
- John Moody (Chair) resigned from the Board.
- Susannah Leydon-Davis resigned from the Board.

## COST OF GOVERNANCE

Board related costs for 2022 were \$7,801 compared to \$4,251 in 2021 and \$8,201 in 2020. Board costs in 2022 continued to remain at a low level, as the Board continued to utilise digital technology (Zoom) for the majority of Board meetings. We expect the Board to continue with a hybrid meeting model with most meetings online, for the foreseeable future.
