PRESIDENT'S REPORT

IAN WILLANS

I have great pleasure reporting my past year as President of Badminton New Zealand activities.

Prior to being elected it was always my intention to ensure that as an organisation Badminton New Zealand reconnected with all levels of Associations. Ensuring the national body understands and connects regionally is critical to the success of our sport. I have visited many areas of the country and it has been heartening to see many Associations thriving through their linkages with Badminton New Zealand. This alignment to programmes and initiatives of Badminton Oceania and the Badminton World Federation provides a solid foundation of best practice for the continued growth and development of badminton in New Zealand.





Providing opportunities for young people to participate in badminton is fundamentally important and it is good to see the strong progress continuing to be made through Shuttle Time with more than 35,000 kiwi kids experiencing this programme in 2016. Giving kids the chance to learn about badminton early puts them on a pathway to enjoying our game for life. I attended the New Zealand Junior Team Championships event in Palmerston North which featured nearly 500 young players all passionate about playing badminton. Without doubt this was an amazing event, exceptionally well organised and with a wonderful group of volunteers which are the life blood of our sport supporting these players.

I also had the opportunity to watch our youngest representative team, the New Zealand Under 15 Team, play a one-off test match against Australia at the Xiamen Air Australian Badminton Open Super Series Event in Sydney. This was a proud moment seeing these players compete on the same courts as the global super stars of badminton. The team represented themselves and their country with huge pride and it was fantastic to see this and the progress we are making in our junior performance programme. Also at this event I had the opportunity to spend time with Poul Erik Hoyer, President of the Badminton World Federation, Geraldine Brown, President of Badminton Australia and Badminton Oceania and Paul Brettell CEO Badminton Australia. It is great to be able to enhance our relationships and communication with these key partners.

From juniors to masters, the work of Badminton New Zealand covers a wide scope. I also attended the New Zealand National Masters Championships in North Harbour which was another well attended event and was played in fantastic spirit. The friendships and comradery that badminton provides to generations of people is great to see. In 2017 we will welcome more than a thousand players from around the globe during the World Masters Games 2017. This will be a major event with a large workload, but it will also provide an amazing experience and a lasting legacy.

The Badminton New Zealand Board has met five times this year. Stephen Nelson and Mary Gardiner were

appointed as shared chairs of the board following the AGM in April and I feel this has proven to be a very successful approach. Our board meetings have been very productive with a great mix of expertise and experience leading to constructive decision making. Many thanks to our hard-working Chief Executive Joe Hitchcock.

The proposed new constitution for our organisation has been a key piece of work for the Board. It has been very challenging finalising all the work completed over the last two years regarding the constitution review and we hope it is received with approval from the members. Special thanks go to Mary Gardiner for the tireless work that she has led through the Board Sub Committee tackling this project.

Badminton New Zealand's success in 2016 has been due to the hard work and dedication of many people and organisations. I wish to thank our partners and sponsors, in particular Badminton Oceania, the Badminton World Federation, Sport New Zealand, the New Zealand Olympic Committee, SKYCITY, One Pure, Honda, Barfoot and Thompson, Rockit, Massey University, the New Zealand Chinese Sports Association and the gaming trust funding organisations for their generous support.

We greatly appreciate the continued support and work of our twenty-five member Associations and the hundreds of volunteers that provide countless badminton experiences around the country. The significant strides we are beginning to make are a result of working together and I would like to thank the Badminton New Zealand staff for their contribution.

I am looking forward to the next twelve months with a number of initiatives that will continue to inspire Kiwis to love badminton for life. It will be exciting to see the Badminton New Zealand performance programme develop further and watch the New Zealand teams compete in the Sudirman Cup and at the World Junior Championships. The SKYCITY New Zealand Badminton Open will again be a highlight as we see world class badminton in our own backyard in August. Finally, I look forward to continuing to work together to grow and develop our great game of badminton from grassroots communities to the elite global level.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

JOE HITCHCOCK

In 2016, Badminton New Zealand continued to build our programmes, competitions, events and capability to inspire more kiwis to love badminton for life.

From participation to performance, Badminton New Zealand has strived to deliver enhanced value back to the New Zealand badminton community through a range of initiatives.

We have been fortunate in 2016 to receive increased investment from key partners including Sport New Zealand, New Zealand Major Events and Badminton Oceania.

This enhanced resource has led to key achievements being made across our core strategic goals.



KEY HIGHLIGHTS IN 2016 INCLUDE

- More than 35,000 kiwi kids participated in the Shuttle Time programme this year. This is a fantastic initiative that provides the base for learning badminton and it is exciting to see more and more associations and schools delivering this programme.
- More than 100 Shuttle Time Teachers and Coaches were trained through 7 professional development opportunities delivered in partnership with Badminton Oceania.
- More than 30 people became Shuttle Time Tutors. This culminated with New Zealand's first Shuttle Time Conference which provided a great opportunity for further development and best practice sharing with those leading Shuttle Time in their region.
- Through the support of Badminton Oceania, 5 New Zealand Coaches have achieved their BWF Level II qualification and the BWF Level I Tutor qualification, following an intensive week of training in Kuala Lumpur. These coaches are now qualified to deliver BWF Level I courses with the aim being to increase the skills of our coaches throughout the country.
- 20 participants registered and undertook the BWF Level I Coach qualification across two weekends in 2016.
- 33 coaches from 14 associations attended the Badminton New Zealand Coaches Conference in December. Supported by Badminton Oceania, this two-day conference also included participants from Australia and Tonga.
- Badminton NZ partnered with Badminton Oceania to deliver performance camps, programmes and coach development for Pacific Island players and coaches.
- New Zealand had four representatives from four different associations at the Badminton Oceania Para Badminton Workshop in Melbourne in April 2016. Six New Zealanders took part in the Badminton Oceania Managers Workshop in February 2016.
- The SKYCITY New Zealand Badminton Open was successfully delivered with 248 players from 26 countries. The semi-finals and finals were televised live in NZ and into key target markets in Asia, with a reach of 108 million households. This included 406 broadcast hours and was a 235% increase in household reach to China from last year.
- Supported Badminton Waikato in the delivery of the Maurice's Pools and Spas Waikato International, a Future Series event that featured 95 players from 10 countries.
- New Zealand hosted the Thomas and Uber Cup qualifying event, the Oceania Men's and Women's Team Championships and the Oceania Mixed Teams Championships at North Harbour in February 2016.



- Completed the contract and agreement to partner with New Zealand Major Events for the SKYCITY New Zealand Badminton Open.
- Delivery of 10 National Championship Events and supported 47 Badminton New Zealand Sanctioned Events. These events took place around the country and included thousands of competitors from under the age of 13 to over the age of 80.
- The Badminton New Zealand Inter Association Competition included 48 teams in Divisions 1 - 5, 46 teams in the North Island Masters, 17 teams in the South Island Masters, 40 teams in the North Island Veterans and 15 teams in the North Island Super Veterans.
- Corrie Robinson won the SL3/4 Singles Title at the 2016 Australian Para-Badminton Championships in Melbourne.
- The New Zealand Men's Team won the 2016 Oceania Men's Team Championships and qualified for the Thomas Cup in China where they went on to beat South Africa in pool play.
- Kevin Dennerly-Minturn and Susannah Leydon-Davis won the Mixed Doubles at the 2016 Maurice's Pools and Spas Waikato International.
- Dacmen Vong and Erena Calder-Hawkins won the Mixed Doubles at the 2016 Li-Ning Australian Junior International.



- Oliver Leydon-Davis partnered with Danish player Lasse Molhede to win the Men's Doubles title at the 2016 Norwegian International.
- The New Zealand Junior Team competed at the BWF World Junior Championships in Spain beating South Africa, Macau China and Portugal to finish 27th overall.
- Delivery of two Badminton New Zealand Association Conferences in April and November to bring member associations together to discuss opportunities to grow and develop badminton.
- Badminton New Zealand Programme Manager Donna Trow was awarded an Oceania Women in Badminton Scholarship to support leadership development.
- The Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme supported more than 80 performance players in 2016. This important programme continues to grow and develop thanks to the work of the NZ National Team, NZ Junior team, NZU19 and NZU15 coaches.
- Badminton New Zealand Technical Officials continue to be well represented nationally and internationally - this includes;

- Greg Busch (Line Judge) and Trish Gubb (Umpire) officiated at the 2016 Rio Olympic Games.
- Sidney Galos (New Zealand) upgraded from Oceania Accredited to Oceania Certificated. Greg Pitcher (New Zealand) upgraded from NZ National Level to Oceania Accredited.
- Successful in accessing NZOC Olympic Solidarity Funding in 2016 that will see continued support for coach development.
- Continued work on the new constitution for Badminton New Zealand in partnership with associations. This exciting piece of work will see an updated and improved constitution presented to associations to vote on in 2017.

A tremendous amount of work goes into achieving these key results and it is important to recognise the Board of Badminton New Zealand, the staff of Badminton New Zealand, our key volunteers and convenors, our 25 member associations, our sponsors, our funders, and the wider badminton community. I would personally like to thank Stephen Nelson and Mary Gardiner as Co-Chairs of Badminton New Zealand for their wisdom and expertise in strategically guiding our organisation towards bigger and better outcomes. I would also like to thank Ian Willans, President of Badminton New Zealand and Nigel Skelt, Vice President of Badminton New Zealand for their passion and commitment in supporting our sport from the grassroots to an international level.



Although 2016 has seen significant progress across a number of areas, continued work is required to build capacity and capability at all levels. Badminton still faces challenges to ensure we reach the potential of our sport and continue to move forward. The proposed new constitution for Badminton New Zealand has been a major piece of work over the last few years and we hope that this will come to a positive conclusion in 2017. The proposed new constitution is a great first step in meeting the challenges our sport faces by ensuring we have the strongest foundation to serve our game. As badminton grows in New Zealand it is critical that our organisation and our partners grow with it.

As we head into another busy year in 2017 we look forward to working with our stakeholders and partners to continue to grow and develop badminton in New Zealand.

EVENTS

JULIE CARREL

2016 was a year of building on the changes which had been implemented in 2015; building capacity within the events team as we head towards the World Masters Games in April 2017 and continually striving to deliver more and better events.

We welcomed Sam Paterson and Jonathon Stone to the staff; both of whom have considerable badminton event experience due to their involvement with the SKYCITY New Zealand Open over a number of years.





The SKYCITY New Zealand Open was undoubtedly the highlight and highest profile event for the year; 248 players from 26 countries including 20 players/pairs ranked in the top 20 in the world, 406 broadcast hours to over 15 countries encompassing a 108 million household reach including 10 hours live coverage in New Zealand. This event has now established itself as part of the BWF Grand Prix Gold Series with high accolades being received; none of this could be achieved without the help of our dedicated 180 volunteers.

Planning for and promoting badminton at the World Masters Games 2017 has been a key role throughout 2016; this is an event which is very different to our standard events but extremely important to us as we work towards a target of 900 players.

Thank you to everyone who has supported and contributed to the many events delivered in 2016; including sponsors, funders, product providers, technical officials and the numerous volunteers.

Seniors Division One & Two – Wisden and Slazenger Cups:

- This was held at Auckland this year.
- Waikato 1 won the Wisden Cup this year after being 2nd last year.
- Waitakere 2 were outplayed in all ties so they return back to Slazenger for 2017.
- In Slazenger, Canterbury just won all 5 ties and are return to Wisden Cup next year.
- Bay of Plenty lost all ties, so is relegated to Division 3 for 2017.

Seniors Division Three – New Zealand Final

- Waikato 2 defeated Otago 1 to win the NZ Seniors Division 3 and are promoted to Slazenger for 2017.

Seniors North Island Division Five

- With only 4 teams entered, this was run as 1 x pool with all teams playing each other twice.
- This only gave each team 6 ties for the season.

Seniors South Island Division 3

- 6 teams played in 1 pool. Otago 1 won this Division for the 3rd year in a row.

Masters and Veterans North and South Island

- Still the most popular categories with no major issues.
- Masters North Island Divisions 1 to 4 each played as a pool of 9 teams
- Masters North Island Division 5 was split into a northern zone of 6 teams playing a total of 5 ties over 3 x weekends and a southern zone of 5 teams. Waikato 4 withdrew leaving 4 teams, so they played each other twice - playing 6 ties over 3 weekends. For the play offs in the 4th weekend, the top 4 teams from the Northern Zone played all 4 teams from the Southern Zone
- Veterans North Island Divisions 1 to 3 each played as a pool of 9 teams.
- Veterans North Island Division 4 had 7 teams playing 6 ties in Zone A and 7 teams playing 6 ties in Zone B with play offs. The top 6 teams in each Zone attended the play-offs.
- Masters South Island Divisions 1 and 2 played as a pool of 6 teams.
- Masters South Island Division 3 played as a pool of

5 teams.

- Veterans South Island Divisions 1 to 2 played as a pool of 4 teams.
- Veterans South Island Division 3 played as a pool of 5 teams.

Super Veterans

- With 2 new teams, Division 1 remained at 6 teams, with Division 2 increasing to 9.
- Division 1 had 6 teams and played 1 round of 5 ties over 3 weekends.
- Division 2 had 9 teams and played 8 ties over 4 weekends.

Team entries for 2017

- Overall, the team entry numbers have increased by 1.
- 3 more in Senior North Island, 2 less in Masters North Island, 1 less in Veterans North Island and 1 more in Super Veterans.
- The Senior North Island Division 5 has increased to 7 teams (up from 4) – so get 6 ties each.
- Masters North Island Division 5 has dropped to 8 teams so will play as 1 pool.
- Veterans North Island Division 4 (13 teams) is split into Northern Zone of 7 teams and Southern Zone of 6 teams. Top 2 teams from both Zones progress to the play-offs.
- Super Vets Division 1 increases to 7 teams – each playing 6 ties over 3 weekends
- Super Vets Division 2 remains with 9 teams playing 8 ties over 4 weekends.

SHUTTLE TIME

The BWF Shuttle Time Programme is the identified entry level programme in Badminton New Zealand's player and coach development pathway.

This programme aims to make badminton one of the world's most popular sports. The BWF Shuttle Time Programme is designed for children:

- Of all ages and abilities to be successful in developing badminton skills.
- To learn basic badminton skills through the activities in the lessons and;
- To develop physical skills while learning badminton through activities in the BWF Shuttle Time programme.

The quality delivery of this programme lays the foundations for players and coaches to transition from a school setting to a club setting and then onto a performance setting.

In 2016 Associations in partnerships with clubs and schools delivered Shuttle time to:

- 35,288 Participants, (18,320 male participants, 16,940 female participants)
- Hours of delivery: 155,371
- Delivered to 290 schools

An important component to ensuring the quality delivery of the Shuttle Time programme is the development of Shuttle Time Tutors and Teacher/Coaches.

In 2016, 25 Shuttle Time Tutors were trained along with 103 Shuttle Time Teachers/Coaches.

In terms of resources; the development of the BWF Shuttle Time App was established and it will be hugely beneficial to the way Shuttle Time can be promoted to teachers and schools in the future. This app will mean it will be a lot easier for new teachers & coaches to badminton to gain confidence in delivery.

As the Shuttle Time programme becomes entrenched in Badminton New Zealand's player and coach development programme, there has become a need to ensure the leaders of this delivery have an opportunity to become connected. This idea resulted in the inaugural Shuttle Time Conference being

held in December, with 21 people from 14 different organisations attending.

The main outcomes of this conference were:

- Provide an opportunity for people delivering the Shuttle Time programme to come together.
- Share Best Practice.
- Review successes and challenges of the year.
- Cover off the reporting requirements.
- For Badminton New Zealand to understand training and support needs in 2017.

Badminton New Zealand would like to thank our Associations, Badminton Oceania and the BWF for their continued support in the delivery of Shuttle Time.

COACH EDUCATION

BWF Level 2

A key focus of Badminton New Zealand's coaching goals for 2016 was to increase the number of performance coaches accessing high level coach education opportunities. In 2016, Badminton New Zealand identified 5 coaches who attended the BWF Level 2 Coach Education course in Kuala Lumpur. All five coaches who attended received the BWF Level 2 qualification.

BWF Level 1 Tutor

In 2016, 5 coaches attended a BWF Level 1 Tutor Course.

The BWF Level 1 Tutor Course is delivered on a continental and national level by qualified BWF Tutors / Educators.

BWF Tutors / Educators must demonstrate high levels of competency in the following areas:

- Planning.
- Administration and reporting.
- Presentation skills.

- Communication.
- Knowledge of course content - what to coach, when to coach, how to coach.
- Evaluation and feedback.

4 New Zealand representatives passed this qualification with 1 coach receiving a provisional pass.

BWF Level 1

An important component of having more people playing badminton is to ensure there are more active coaches being developed who are able to deliver a high quality experience for the participant. The BWF Level 1 Coach Education Course is Badminton New Zealand's platform to develop identified Association coaches to deliver quality experiences for the participant.

In 2016 the BWF Level 1 Coach Education Course was held over two weekends. The delivery of the course was provided by the tutors who attended the BWF Level 1 Tutor course in Kuala Lumpur earlier in the year. It was fantastic to see the transition of learning to implementation taking place.

20 participants registered and undertook the BWF Level 1 Course in 2016. 17 participants passed, 1 person received a provisional and 2 participants have been asked to re-sit the course in 2017.



Para Badminton

In 2016, 4 New Zealand representatives attended the Para Badminton Workshop in Melbourne. The objectives of the Badminton Oceania Para-Badminton Education Workshop were:

- To educate para-badminton coaches and administrators by sharing knowledge of para-badminton
- To increase the information flow around para-badminton between Member Associations
- To increase the number of active para-badminton coaches and administrators in Oceania

Coaching Conference

The inaugural Badminton New Zealand Coaching Conference was held Saturday 3rd December – Sunday 4th December. 32 people from 16 different associations attended including a contingent from Badminton Australia and Tonga National Badminton Association. There were 8 presenters who delivered various sessions at the conference.

Attendees varied in age and experience, however all contributed to the sessions and were able to share coaching experiences and situations. For many of the coaches attending, they found this aspect of the

conference to be very beneficial. This confirmed that a coaching conference is the ideal platform for coaches to be able to come together to share ideas and experiences. Having Badminton Oceania presenters and attendees at the conference also added immense value and a refreshing outside perspective.

From an NSO perspective the major benefit of the conference was being able to inform people at the heart of coaching about what we are trying to achieve through our coach and player pathways. Often national strategy can get missed in translation however, by Badminton New Zealand delivering the conference, not only were we able to deliver clarity around our strategy, but we were also able to gain insights into coaches 'on-the-court' queries and concerns.

Badminton New Zealand is very grateful for the financial support that we received from Sport New Zealand to run this coaching conference which allowed us to connect with a variety of coaches who are contributing to making Badminton New Zealand have stronger badminton communities, encouraging more people to play badminton and enabling better badminton performances.

Badminton New Zealand would like to thank our Associations, Badminton Oceania and the BWF for their continued support in the attendance of Coach Education opportunities.





PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

In 2016 Badminton New Zealand were focussed on continuing to push for better badminton performances whilst striving to deliver quality performance programmes for our junior athletes.

Several opportunities were established in what became a very busy programme for the New Zealand U15 and U19 squad members.

- Napier January Performance Camp, 4 days.
- 2 x 2 day Performance Camps.
- Trans-Tasman U15 Test Match.
- 2 day Selection Camp for 2017 Squad.

NZ U19's

- Napier January Performance Camp, 8 days.

- 2 x 2 day Performance Camps.
- Oceania Championships.
- Sydney International and Australian Junior International.
- World Junior Championships.
- 2 day Selection Camp for 2017 Squad.

Peter Jensen, Tracey Hallam, Robbie Thackham, Brent Miller and Sandra Lynch are the key cogs to the success of these programmes and Badminton New Zealand thank them for all the tireless work they do to pull the performance programme together.

In 2017 Badminton New Zealand aims to work more closely with the Associations to provide stronger links and pathways for regional development players into the performance programme. This will be established by delivering regional development camps which will allow for more badminton players to receive an insight into what the next level of badminton development entails.

PERFORMANCE

Performance is a critical component to the work of Badminton New Zealand and 2016 saw a continued focus in this area. Badminton New Zealand has limited access to investment for performance outcomes and this has made improving in this area difficult.

Gaining better clarity on the performance pathways and programmes has greatly assisted in allocating scarce resources to achieve the best outcomes possible. Looking back on 2016 we are proud of the achievements of our players and coaches and we are excited to build on these next year.



Key highlights include:

- The Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme supported more than 80 performance players in 2016. This important programme continues to grow and develop thanks to the work of the NZ National Team, NZ Junior team, NZU19 and NZU15 coaches.
- The New Zealand Under 15 Team competed again against Australia at the Xiamen Air Australian Badminton Open Super Series Event in Sydney.
- Corrie Robinson won the SL3/4 Singles Title at the 2016 Australian Para-Badminton Championships in Melbourne.
- The New Zealand Men's Team won the 2016 Oceania Men's Team Championships and qualified for the Thomas Cup in China where they went on to beat South Africa in pool play.
- Kevin Dennerly-Minturn and Susannah Leydon-Davis won the Mixed Doubles at the 2016 Maurice's Pools and Spas Waikato International.
- Dacmen Vong and Erena Calder-Hawkins won the Mixed Doubles at the 2016 Li-Ning Australian Junior International.
- Oliver Leydon-Davis partnered with Danish player Lasse Molhede to win the Men's Doubles title at the 2016 Norwegian International.
- The New Zealand Junior Team competed at the BWF World Junior Championships in Spain beating South Africa, Macau China and Portugal to finish 27th overall.





Key to the delivery of the Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme are our national coaches; Peter Jensen, Tracey Hallam, Robbie Thackham, Brent Miller and Sandra Lynch. Their continued contribution is critical to the success of the programme and we greatly appreciate their expertise and experience in guiding our players toward reaching their potential. It is great to see these coaches continuing to work together and that this is also linked to continued personal development through the BWF Level 2 Coach Education pathway.

Sadly, in 2016 Peter Jensen made the difficult decision to return to Denmark and conclude his role with the performance programme in 2017. Peter has done a fantastic job in building the Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme from the ground up. Through his vision and determination, the Junior Performance Programme has been well and truly established to a point where we are now seeing strong results. Coaching the New Zealand Men's Team to beat Australia, win the Oceania Men's Team Championships and then to compete at the Thomas Cup and win against South Africa is a testament to what he has achieved and the progress he has made. On behalf

of Badminton New Zealand we thank Peter for his contribution and hope he remains connected with our programme in the years to come.

2017 will be an important year for our Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme as we look to take even bigger strides to achieving results in this important strategic area. Competing in the Sudirman Cup, qualifying for the 2018 Commonwealth Games and improving our placing at the World Junior Championships are all on our horizon and we look forward to meeting these challenges head on. Partnership with Associations and stakeholders will be critical for success in this area to ensure we are working together for better performance outcomes.

Notes to the Financial Statements

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc For the year ended 31 December 2016

1. Reporting Entity

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is subject to the provisions of the Act. The financial statements are a special purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies below.

These financial statements have not been prepared for external use. They are prepared for governance purposes only and should not be relied on for any other purpose.

The comparative figures provided in the financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2015.

2. Statement of Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Measurement Base

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grants and sponsorship are recognised when the conditions attached to the grants have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions.

Membership Levies are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Entry Fees and Player Contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined on a first-in-first-out basis, and net realisable value.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of fixed assets is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.



Notes to the Financial Statements

Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

Opinion
