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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This past year has seen significant work being achieved across badminton in all parts of New Zealand as our sport continues to grow and expand. I have great pleasure reporting on the last twelve months as President of Badminton New Zealand and reflecting on the outcomes the organisation has achieved with the help of its many partners.

It is always my intention to ensure that Badminton New Zealand connects with as many Associations as possible. I have visited many areas of the country this year and it has been great to see Associations building their badminton community. Our twenty-five Associations play an important role in growing and delivering positive badminton experiences to ensure more people play badminton more often. With increased focus from Badminton New Zealand in building the capability and capacity of Associations, we are seeing more effective regional organisations and a stronger badminton workforce around the country. It is exciting that many Associations are hiring staff and making great progress in delivering badminton in their region.

Following the change to the Badminton New Zealand constitution, the Board have worked hard on further defining and prioritising our strategic plan. The Board continued the successful practice of appointing co-chairs for the organisation with Stephen Nelson remaining in this role and Hetty Van Hale stepping up following the AGM. Special thanks to Mary Gardiner for the excellent work she achieved as co-chair, especially in leading the board sub-committee for the constitutional change. The Board met



five times in 2017 and is fortunate to have the mix of expertise and experience to guide Badminton New Zealand forward. Badminton New Zealand were also pleased to successfully nominate Nigel Skelt as the Vice President of Badminton Oceania and we were delighted to see Nigel's re-election to the Badminton World Federation Council where he will continue his important work in supporting the game globally.

I was delighted to host Poul-Erik Hoyer, President of the Badminton World Federation, when he was visiting New Zealand for the World Masters Games 2017. Not only was this an important opportunity to show our kiwi hospitality, but also the chance to further our strong relationship

with our world body. The Badminton World Federation continue to go from strength to strength and Badminton New Zealand are fortunate to have a strong partnership with Badminton Oceania to deliver international programmes, initiatives and events. We were incredibly proud of the delivery of the badminton component of the World Masters Games 2017 that Poul-Erik Hoyer saw during his visit. Full credit goes to the Badminton New Zealand events staff who pulled together and put on what we believe would be the largest badminton event in our country. The World Masters Games 2017 organising committee and board had extremely positive feedback on the badminton competition and this reflects the hard work and commitment by our staff and the amazing volunteers who supported the event.

The year was also unique in the opportunity to have world-class coach Lars Uhre here in New Zealand working with our emerging performance programme. Lars's recently coached the Danish Team to their World Men's Team World Championship title and previously achieved two bronze medals with team Denmark at the Rio Olympics. Having a coach of Lars' calibre working with our players, coaches and Badminton New Zealand staff has provided significant benefit to the organisation. The expertise and advice has provided a launching pad for our performance programme to take the next step and through this we are delighted to have secured former Danish Junior National



Coach, Rikke Olsen-Siegemund, as our new National Coach and Performance Manager.

Badminton New Zealand greatly appreciates the fantastic support and contribution of our sponsors and partners. I extend my heartfelt thanks to Sport New Zealand, New Zealand Major Events, the New Zealand Olympic Committee, Badminton Oceania, the Badminton World Federation, Barfoot & Thompson, SKYCITY, OnePure, Honda, Massey University, the New Zealand Chinese Sports Association and the gaming trust funding organisations. Without the generous support of these organisations, Badminton New Zealand would not have been able to achieve the many successes of 2017.

The next year will provide a number of challenges and opportunities. Badminton New Zealand must continue to push forward and capitalise on the good work achieved to date and the momentum of our thriving sport. There are exciting times ahead as the Barfoot & Thompson New Zealand Open launches into its first cycle as a Super 300 event on the new HSBC BWF World Tour. Our participation numbers continue to surge through the well-established Shuttle Time programme being delivered by our valued Association network. I am confident that our performance programme will continue to take steps forward in both the quality on the training court through to performances on the world stage. I look forward to continuing to work together with all our stakeholders to support our great game.

# CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Badminton New Zealand took significant steps forward in 2017 delivering on many new and enhanced initiatives that inspired more and more kiwis to love badminton for life. Badminton is booming around the country and this rapid growth presents exciting opportunities along with new challenges. Across all areas, Badminton New Zealand is increasing our work to provide value to the badminton community. We cover a broad spectrum of activities – from participation to performance and all things badminton in between.

This year has seen major achievements in our key strategic areas of building stronger communities, getting more people engaged and delivering better badminton performances. Our twenty-five Member Associations and our sponsors & stakeholders have played a critical role in this success and we thank them for partnering with us to make a difference through badminton.

As an organisation, Badminton New Zealand is well placed to continue to grow and excel. We are very excited about the future of our sport with the new constitution voted in by member Associations in 2017. This is a major change that sees Badminton New Zealand's scope widen from strictly servicing Associations to leading badminton in a whole of sport approach. Badminton New Zealand now has a direct connection to participants of the game and through the tiered model we will have stronger partnerships with Associations. The Board of Badminton New Zealand have played a fantastic role in making this happen through a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes.

In 2017 Badminton New Zealand delivered the badminton component of the World Masters Games. This was a huge undertaking with increased complexities involved in being part of one of the world's largest multi-sport games. A special thanks to Julie Carrel who led this event and the great work of our Badminton New Zealand events team of Lynne Nixey, Jonathon Stone and Sam Paterson who delivered an exceptional event experience for more than 1200 badminton players from around the world. In speaking with many international players, the WMG2017 organising committee and



key stakeholders, the consistent theme was the level of professionalism and passion of the staff and volunteers that supported the event.

Our Badminton New Zealand events staff continued to deliver excellent national and international events throughout 2017. The New Zealand Open was again a highlight with the calibre of players getting better and better every year. The event saw an international broadcast to more than 100 million households again in 2017 and it was fantastic to see the opportunities this event presents to our New Zealand players, coaches, officials, volunteers and fans.

Our Badminton New Zealand development programmes continue to grow in size and strength with Shuttle Time resonating well with the badminton community. More than 33,000 kiwi kids picked up a racquet and accessed Shuttle Time in their School, Club, Association or Community. A further 92 teachers and coaches from around New Zealand were trained to deliver Shuttle Time, which saw a massive 151,054 hours of badminton delivered to children. The increase in quality of the Shuttle Time programme is also an important metric for our programme and it has great to see further professional development and focus being invested in this area.

Coach education has also been at the forefront of the work of Badminton New Zealand with the continuation of the BWF Level 1 Coach Education qualifications and an extension of our coach development camps and coaching conference. Coaches are such an important component to delivering high

quality badminton experiences and we will continue to focus on this space from both a participation and performance angle. Donna Trow, our Badminton New Zealand Programme Manager, has worked tirelessly in this area in partnership with Badminton Oceania to build our national development programmes in a strong, vibrant and sustainable way that connects into our player pathways.

From participation to performance, we are starting to see progress through the investment and resources focused on the Badminton New Zealand Junior Performance Programme. New Zealand became the first country to win all five individual titles and also the mixed team title at the 2017 Oceania Junior Championships in Noumea, New Caledonia. This speaks to the excellent work being achieved by our performance coaching group of Brent Miller, Sandra Lynch, Robbie Thackham, Tracey Hallam, Peter Jensen and our junior player Association coaches. The New Zealand Junior Team had an impressive campaign at the BWF World Junior Team Championships, beating the USA, Norway



and Armenia to finish in the top 20 in the world.

The Badminton New Zealand Senior Performance Programme started to gain more structure in 2017 and it was pleasing to see the New Zealand team back competing at the Sudirman Cup on the Gold Coast. Through the work of Badminton New Zealand Performance Coordinator Brent Miller, the New Zealand National Squad is now established, operating a consistent training programme and building towards the introduction of our new Performance Manager and National Coach, Rikke Olsen-Siegemund. We also had an injection of elite coaching expertise with world champion coach Lars Uhre. Advising Badminton New Zealand and having the opportunity to see badminton around New Zealand, Lars provided an important performance development piece that has helped enhance and solidify our performance programmes.



the Japan Para-Badminton International and the Para-Badminton World Championships in Korea. Badminton New Zealand has a lot of work to do to build our capability and capacity in Para-Badminton, but with the help of Badminton Oceania we will create more opportunities to access programmes and support performances.

Badminton New Zealand's work in building stronger badminton communities increased exponentially in 2017 with the appointment of our new Community Manager. Chris McIvor has already made an impact in supporting the development of Associations in their organisation capability and capacity. This has also had a flow on affect in increasing the paid badminton workforce with new hires in Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Counties Manukau, Taranaki and Manawatu. The new constitution and Association partnership agreements create a launching pad for further opportunities to work together. Although we are still in the development phase with this, we believe this will be a real difference maker in gaining better alignment and greater efficiency and effectiveness from organisations delivering badminton. A highlight to finish 2017 was our Badminton New Zealand Association Conference which provided a forum to come together, share best practice and focus on improving for the future.



Badminton New Zealand is working towards more structure and resource in the emerging Para-Badminton space. We are excited to become an official member of Paralympics New Zealand and have enjoyed the support and expertise this innovative organisation provides. Corrie Robinson burst on to the international stage with strong showings at

A huge amount of time, effort and passion goes into achieving these outcomes across the work of Badminton New Zealand. I would like to make special mention of the staff of Badminton New Zealand who go above and beyond. # EVENTS

**SAM PATERSON JULIE CARREL JONATHON STONE LYNNE NIXEY**

With the World Masters Games, SKYCITY New Zealand Open and 11 National Championships, 2017 was a busy year for the events team, as we continue to raise standards to ensure players receive a high quality and consistent experiences, regardless of the events in which they participate.

April's World Masters Games, set a new record for the number of badminton participants, exceeding all past events. This was by far the largest badminton event to be organised in New Zealand to date with the main objective being achieved which was to ensure that it was a positive and memorable experience for all involved. Throughout the event Auckland Badminton and Badminton North Harbour hosted a combined 3,891 matches across both team and individual events, three divisions and nine age groups. We also welcomed over 100 volunteers to our team who proved invaluable in executing such a large event.

Following the World Masters Games, attention turned to the SKYCITY New Zealand Open; a BWF Grand Prix Gold tournament with prize-money of USD120,000. Each year this event gets better and better and this year was no exception; the quality of the players was once again of a high standard with 15 players or pairs with top 30 world rankings which made for some spectacular and entertaining play over 6 days at the North Shore Events Centre. The star of the show was Intanon Ratchanok from Thailand

(WR-8) who won the women's singles and the hearts of the hundreds of fans who turned up to watch her play. This event has a significant global reach; it was broadcasted into 16 countries with a household reach of over 100 million people, showing 533 hours of play, 2.1 million minutes of streaming were viewed, the website received 1.2 million hits and there was significant engagement through a number of social media platforms. SKY Sport in New Zealand screened the semi-finals and finals - a total of 11 hours of live coverage.

We would like to acknowledge SKYCITY - our major sponsor for the past 5 years. Their contribution and involvement in the event has seen it grow and become a regular fixture on the international calendar. In 2018 we have a new naming sponsor - BARFOOT & THOMPSON, and will be part of the new HSBC BWF World Tour.

Finally, we would like to offer our gratitude to all who contributed to our many events during 2017; including Associations, technical officials, volunteers, sponsors, funders and product providers. We look forward to another exciting season ahead.

- Remained at 6 teams this year. Otago 1 won this Division for the 4<sup>th</sup> year in a row and then won the NZ Division 3 Final so are promoted to Division 2

## MASTERS AND VETERANS NORTH AND SOUTH ISLAND

- Still the most popular categories with no major issues
- Masters North Island Divisions 1 to 4 each played as a pool of 9 teams
- Masters North Island Division 5 was played as 1 pool of 8
- Veterans North Island Divisions 1 to 3 each played as a pool of 9 teams
- Veterans North Island Division 4 had 7 teams playing 6 ties in Zone A and 6 teams playing 5 ties in Zone B with play offs. The top 2 teams in each Zone attended the play offs
- Masters South Island – all 3 Divisions played as a pool of 6 teams
- Veterans South Island – all 3 Divisions played as a pool of 4 teams

## SUPER VETERANS

- With 1 new team, Division 1 increased to 7 teams, with Division 2 remaining at 9
- Division 1 had 7 teams and played 1 round of 6 ties over 3 weekends
- Division 2 had 9 teams and played 8 ties over 4 weekends

# PROGRAMME DEVELOPMENT

## SHUTTLE TIME

The quality delivery of the Shuttle Time Programme lays the foundations for players and coaches to transition from a school setting to a club setting, and then onto a performance setting.

In 2017, 19 Associations in partnership with clubs and schools delivered Shuttle time to:

- 33,481 Participants
- 17,360 male participants, 16,242 female participants
- 15,1054 delivery hours to participants

An important component to ensuring the quality delivery of the Shuttle Time programme is the ongoing development of Shuttle Time Tutors and Teacher/Coaches.

In 2017, we shifted our focus in terms of how we were educating Shuttle Time deliverers. We became focussed on the coaches/teachers and tutors learning how to coach e.g. understanding and developing the art of coaching before incorporating Shuttle Time activities into their learning. We believe that this has given these deliverers more confidence in terms of managing groups and delivering a positive early badminton experience to participants as the focus is on fun, getting racquets in hands and ensuring the participants want to come back for more badminton. 92 Teachers/Coaches and Leaders were trained in Shuttle Time whilst 3 Shuttle Time Tutors were trained and 2 received provisional passes.

2017 was also a great year for firsts including the first publication of the Badminton New Zealand Shuttle Time Newsletter which aims to keep Associations and their Development Officers up to date and connected with Shuttle Time and any new initiatives that are being implemented.

The Shuttle Time Volunteer of the Month was also introduced, recognising 7 volunteers from 7 different regions;

The purpose behind this recognition was to acknowledge the people at the coal face of badminton and thank them for making Shuttle Time happen. Without these hardworking volunteers our programmes would cease to exist. Thank you for all that you do.

Badminton New Zealand was also fortunate to be the first country to pilot the BWF Shuttle Time Youth Leadership Award in partnership with the Waikato Badminton Association. The BWF Shuttle Time Youth Leadership Award has been designed to allow 15 - 18 year-old school students the opportunity to gain experience in sports leadership and badminton. The award comes with International Certification from BWF and aims to provide students with the



knowledge and support required to deliver fun, safe and enjoyable badminton lessons to groups of school pupils.

The annual Shuttle Time Coordinators Conference was held for the second year with 27 people attending from 12 different Associations. The main outcomes of this conference were:

- Provide an opportunity for people delivering the Shuttle Time programme to come together and discuss and share best practice
- Associations gaining an understanding that quality Shuttle Time delivery and implementation will feature within the 2018 Partnership Agreements
- Covering of the reporting requirements
- For Badminton New Zealand to understand training and support needs in 2018

Badminton New Zealand would like to thank our Associations, Badminton Oceania and the BWF for their continued support in the delivery of Shuttle Time.

## COACH EDUCATION

### BWF LEVEL 1

An important component of having more people playing badminton is to ensure there are more active coaches being developed who in turn are delivering high-quality experiences for the participant. The BWF Level 1 Coach Education Course is Badminton New Zealand's platform to develop identified Association coaches to deliver these experiences.

Two BWF Level 1 Coach Education Courses were also delivered over two weekends – these were held in Christchurch and in Wellington. 23 participants registered and undertook the BWF Level 1 Course. Of those who registered; 17 participants passed, 2 people received a provisional pass and 1 participant has been asked to re-sit the course in 2018.

### REGIONAL PLAYER/COACH DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

In 2017 Badminton New Zealand organised

for several coach and player development opportunities to be delivered out to the regions to ensure that more regions could access national performance personnel and programmes. The focus of these sessions was to provide professional development for coaches whilst utilising their players, and in return the players received some top-level tips for improving their game. These sessions are also invaluable for empowering our coaches with knowledge that allows the regions to develop sustainable programmes.

The following professional development opportunities were delivered:

- 4<sup>th</sup> February, Central Region – delivered by Peter Jensen - 23 Players, 6 Coaches
- 5<sup>th</sup> February, Mainland Region – delivered by Peter Jensen - 20 Players, 2 Coaches

Lars Uhre also visited the following regions; North Harbour, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Hawke's Bay, Otago and Southland, and delivered coach upskilling sessions at the National Teams Junior Championships in Palmerston North. The purpose of these visits and sessions were to:

- Meet with the Association to discuss their performance plan
- Meet with the Association to discuss their coaching plan
- Leading and delivering coach education sessions for representative level coaches
- Leading and delivering squad and player sessions for performance players

#### COACHING CONFERENCE

The second annual national coaching conference was held Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> November with 4 presenters and 22 participants involved.

Again, the coaching conference allowed us to connect with a variety of coaches who are contributing to making Badminton

New Zealand have stronger badminton communities, encouraging more people to play badminton and enabling better badminton performances.

Badminton New Zealand would like to thank our Associations, Badminton Oceania and the BWF for their continued support in the attendance of Coach Education opportunities.

#### PARA BADMINTON

Para Badminton was another programme area where there were quite a few notable achievements:

- Acceptance of Badminton New Zealand's application to become a member of Paralympics New Zealand
- Badminton New Zealand supported Waikato Badminton Association Para Badminton athlete, Corrie Robinson in attending two Para Badminton Internationals; the Japan Para Badminton International and the Para Badminton World Championships held in Korea. Corrie had some impressive results at the Japan Para Badminton International where he made it through to the quarterfinals in the MS SL4 category and the MD SL4 category. At the World Championships Corrie placed in the top 16 in the MS SL4 Category. We look forward to working with Corrie and seeing what he can achieve in 2018.

In 2018 Badminton New Zealand will aim to work with some Associations to develop the capability and capacity of the Para Badminton programme by supporting Associations to deliver open days, develop a Para Badminton Club and deliver a Para Badminton Event.

Badminton New Zealand would again like to thank Badminton Oceania for their support in helping us develop this programme area.



# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

CHRIS MCIVOR

Stronger badminton communities was a major focus in 2017. Badminton New Zealand is passionate about our sport being played in a range of settings led by strong organisations and involving people from Cape Reinga to Bluff. After spending time with a number of Associations from around the country, we have formulated our thinking on how we drive badminton in the community with a clear vision:

- Shuttle Time programmes getting 'rackets in hands' of young people and families in every town in New Zealand.
- Badminton in schools, churches, community groups, maraes. The game in the community enticing people back to fantastic badminton halls or programmes in regional facilities.
- Associations with solid foundations in governance, finance and planning linked to regional sports trusts, local councils, schools and funders.
- Regional project collaboration linked to regional and national funders.
- A paid workforce throughout the country driving the game forward and supporting clearly defined and enjoyable roles for those that are volunteering.

A key driver of the work we do in the community will stem from the Association Tier Application process we conducted in 2017 in line with the new Badminton New Zealand constitution. Through this process we now have a better picture of how Associations are tracking and have formed the basis of setting Partnership Agreements with targeted outcomes moving forward. A pilot agreement with Waikato Badminton has provided clearer insights into the agreements going forward.

Badminton Hawke's Bay, Taranaki Badminton, Manawatu Badminton and Counties Manukau Badminton have all undertaken strategic reviews in 2017 led by Badminton New Zealand. This has highlighted 3 key areas of regional focus to drive the game forward; Quality Leaders, Quality Programmes and Quality Deliverers. More focus on the 'new' versus the 'existing' and challenging the future is clear in these plans. Clubs, Inter Association and Junior Representative teams become business as usual whilst Shuttle Time, funding and new initiatives become key parts of strategies.



Growth in the workforce has seen Community Development Officers appointed in Hawke's Bay, Hutt Valley, Wellington North, Manawatu and Counties Manukau. Aligning workforce growth with regional funding projects including KiwiSport, Eastern and Central Community Trust and Youth Town is helping build a bigger Shuttle Time coach workforce. This creates an increased coverage of Shuttle Time throughout the country.

For the first time badminton was part of the Sport New Zealand Voice of the Participant survey - providing a picture of how the game is viewed by stakeholders at grassroots level. Results were presented at the Association Conference held in November. This Conference highlighted the willingness for us all to work together on the future of the game. Discussions on the future of Inter Association, community initiatives and branding were highly energising in

challenging the future.

During the year some targeted initiatives have been put into action to provide insights into how we can work more effectively going forward, and to promote the game in key areas. In partnership with the Hutt Valley Badminton Association, Shuttle Time was launched in Masterton for the first time and the Shuttle Time Youth Leadership Programme was launched in Waikato and Hawke's Bay. The opportunity to present at the South Island Secondary Schools Sports Conference highlighted the importance of badminton in the secondary school space.

A sincere thank you to all of the Association boards, committees, staff and volunteers for their ongoing commitment to badminton at the coalface. In 2018 the journey continues.



# PERFORMANCE

## BRENT MILLER

It has been a very busy 12 months for our Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme with a number of players, coaches and assistants taking advantage of the numerous opportunities offered to them both locally and internationally. 2017 saw the Badminton New Zealand Performance Programme extended to cover more players and provide better opportunities.

### NEW ZEALAND UNDER 15 SQUAD

The Badminton New Zealand Under 15 performance programme was headed by Brent Miller with the support of Sandra Lynch, Ben Yu and Kylie Luo. The Under 15 age bracket held a selection camp and three training camps, one of these being the 5 day Napier camp where players not only trained

but also learnt about being an athlete - covering physical conditioning, nutrition and attending talks with athletes to understand life as an athlete.

The Badminton New Zealand Under 15 Squad players achieved the following results;

- 10 players selected for Sydney U15 event
- Trans-Tasman Test Match with Australia - New Zealand winning 10-6
- Singles Tournament - Roanne Apalisok winning the Women's Singles

Associations and players received feedback following these events;

- Napier Training Camp
- Sydney U15 event



### NEW ZEALAND UNDER 19 SQUAD

The Badminton New Zealand Under 19 performance programme was headed by Tracey Hallam with the support of Robbie Thackham, Chris Sharrock, Vinnie Harris and CiCi Xie. Like the NZ Under 15 performance programme, the New Zealand Under 19 Squad has a selection camp along with a further three training camps - with one of those being a 7 day camp in Napier. The Napier camp also hosted 7 Oceania players and 2 Oceania coaches. On top of the performance programme we have four players who are chasing Youth Olympic Games qualification in Buenos Aires in October 2018.

We were very fortunate to have the support from Badminton Oceania and the New Zealand Olympic Committee who have put significant investment in behind both the New Zealand Under 19 performance programme and the Youth Olympic Games qualification.

The NZ U19 Squad players were selected for the following campaigns and achieved the following results;

- 10 players for the Noumea International, Oceania Junior Championships and Oceania junior teams championships held in Noumea
  - New Zealand won the Oceania Junior Mixed Team Championships
  - Oscar Guo won the Men's Singles in the Oceania Junior Championships
  - Sally Fu won the Women's Singles in the Oceania Junior Championships
  - Dacmen Vong and Oscar Guo won the Men's Doubles in the Oceania Junior Championships
  - Sally Fu and Tamara Otene won the Women's Doubles in the Oceania Junior Championships
  - Edward Lau and Christine Zhang won the Mixed Doubles in the Oceania Junior Championships
  - New Zealand becoming the first country to win all five junior

individual titles at the Oceania Junior Championships

- 6 players selected to participate in the PB Jaya Raya Junior Grand Prix
- 12 players selected for Australia Junior International held in Melbourne
- 4 players selected to participate in the Malaysian Junior International to assist with qualification in Youth Olympic Games
- 10 players selected for BWF World Junior Championships held in Indonesia and participate in pre- event training camp.
  - The New Zealand Junior Team placed 20<sup>th</sup>

Associations and players received feedback following these events;

- Napier Training Camp
- Australian Junior International
- Malaysian Junior International
- World Junior Championships

### NEW ZEALAND NATIONAL SQUAD

With the departure of Peter Jensen, Henry Tam took control of the reins with support from Brent Miller to ensure that the New Zealand National Squad completed a full year of a weekly training programme. With players moving through the junior performance programme, we have a group of 23 athletes now regularly training and being monitored. We are thankful for the time Henry has invested in our athletes and look forward to new Badminton New Zealand National Coach and Performance Manager, Rikke Olsen Siegemund, taking the programme to the next stage.

The Badminton New Zealand National Squad were selected for the following campaigns and achieved the following results;

- 7 Athletes selected to participate in the Oceania Championships and Noumea International
- 11 athletes selected to represent New Zealand at the Surdiman Cup in Australia
  - Team finished 7<sup>th</sup> in Division 2, 19<sup>th</sup> overall





## Notes to the Financial Statements

### Badminton New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 31 December 2017

#### 1. Reporting Entity

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is subject to the provisions of the Act. The financial statements are a special purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies below.

The comparative figures provided in the financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2016.

#### 2. Statement of Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

##### Measurement Base

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

##### Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

##### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grants (including Sport New Zealand) and sponsorship are recognised when the conditions attached to the grants have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions.

Membership Levies are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Entry Fees (including New Zealand Open) and Player Contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate.

##### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

##### Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined on a first-in-first-out basis, and net realisable value.

##### Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of fixed assets is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

### Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

### Employee Entitlements

The organisation is an amateur sports promoter and is exempt from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

### Goods and Services Tax

All amounts are stated exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

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## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

### To the Readers of the Financial Statements of New Zealand Badminton Incorporated

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of New Zealand Badminton Incorporated on pages 4 to 10, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December 2017, the statement of profit and loss for the year ended 31 December 2017, statement of changes in equity for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements of the New Zealand Badminton Incorporated for the year ended 31 December 2017 are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the basis of accounting as described in Note 1 of the financial statements.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ)). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the society in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) *Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners* issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, New Zealand Badminton Incorporated.

#### Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared for governance purposes only. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the society and should not be distributed to parties other than the society and its members. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

#### Responsibilities of Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Those charged with governance are responsible on behalf of the society for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the basis of accounting and for such internal control as those charged with governance determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



In preparing the financial statements, those charged with governance are responsible for assessing the society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless those charged with governance either intend to liquidate the society or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.
