Badminton New Zealand has made continued progress in 2018 as we strive to meet the increasing demand and challenges of our growth. It has been a privilege to be re-elected as President of Badminton New Zealand this past year and I have enjoyed the opportunity to connect across our twenty-five associations and many stakeholders and partners.

This is evident through several channels, and most recently in the successful New Zealand bids for the BWF World Junior Championships in 2020 and the BWF World Senior Championships in 2025. Through partnerships with New Zealand Major Events and ATEED, we are excited to welcome the world to New Zealand and to watch the inspiring performances that will take place.

Finally, I would like to thank the Board of Badminton New Zealand and our Chair Hetty Van Hale who have done a superb job in leading the governance of our organisation. I would also like to thank the Badminton New Zealand staff who work extremely hard to ensure everything they do contributes to positive badminton experiences that kiwis will love. And lastly, thank you also to our twenty-five member associations who do so much every day to make badminton happen across all communities in New Zealand every day. The future is bright for badminton and I look forward to continuing to work with all our partners to inspire Kiwis to love badminton for life.



CHAIR'S REPORT

HETTY VAN HALE

Tēnā koutou katoa

2018 has been a successful year for Badminton NZ in terms of building on its strategy to 2020. A key emphasis for the Board has been on ensuring we stay focused on our three key strategic priorities in order to maximise the best use of limited resources.

1. Stronger Badminton Communities (capability)

Our twenty-five Associations play a crucial role in delivering positive badminton experiences in New Zealand. This year there was increased focus on partnership agreements between Badminton NZ and the Associations to help build the effectiveness of our regional organisations. It is fantastic to see that with this increased capability, Associations are also building their capacity with the paid workforce in badminton growing rapidly. We look forward to continuing to work together to share best practice and collaborate for the best outcomes for badminton across the country.

During the year the Board resolved to undertake Sport NZ's Governance Mark programme which is an independently verified process of governance capability development. This programme assesses the standard of governance in an organisation and as a first step the board undertook a 'whole of board' self-assessment. Achieving the 'Mark' requires Badminton NZ to be aligned with a mandatory group of elements within the Governance Framework. These include clarity on the board role, strategic planning expressed in outcome terms, a culture of external accountability, good practice board member recruitment, and well-structured meetings. We are currently partway through this process.

2. More People Engaged with Badminton (growth)

2018 saw a large increase in participants in the Shuttle Time programme, up more than 12,000 from last year to 46,229 children and more than 100 teachers/coaches trained. This combined with a further focus on coach education delivery provides a solid foundation for participants across the community to access and enjoy the experience of learning to play badminton. Creating more inclusive opportunities to play badminton also took strong steps forward in 2018 with further work in the para-badminton development space that is already seeing increased performance results on the world stage.

3. Better Badminton Performance (quality)

The board has invested more into the performance programme this year and at the start of 2018 we welcomed Rikke Olsen Siegemund from Denmark as the new Performance Manager & National Coach. A review of the junior performance programme was carried out

in 2018 and key learnings from this review will be put in place for 2019. With the success of the Badminton New Zealand junior performance programme, it is important that the focus now expands to ensure our senior programme and players receive the support they need to succeed. We believe with Rikke's leadership we are well placed in working towards consistent performances on the international stage that inspire kiwis to love badminton for life.

Partnerships with our stakeholders are critical to our success and I would like to acknowledge the support we continue to have, at both operational and governance levels, from the team at Sport NZ. Thanks too must go to all our key partners – New Zealand Major Events, ATEED, the New Zealand Olympic Committee, Badminton Oceania, the Badminton World Federation, Barfoot and Thompson, Massey University and all our event & programme partners who help us deliver badminton nationally each year. Without the generous support of these organisations, we would not have been able to achieve all that has been achieved in 2018.

On behalf of the Board I would like to thank our Chief Executive Joe Hitchcock and his team. Joe is providing excellent leadership and was recognised during the year by Sport NZ with a Future Leader's Scholarship to further develop his leadership skills. Joe's team is passionate and dedicated to growing badminton in New Zealand and the current rapid growth in the sport in New Zealand is testament to their efforts.

The health, safety and wellbeing of all Badminton New Zealand employees is vitally important to the Board. Monitoring programmes in the workplace are in place as part of our overall risk monitoring framework, but the Board has identified the need for a better health and safety reporting at a board level and this is currently in development.

Badminton New Zealand also led the way in living our participant centred approach with the successful trial and implementation of an Athlete Representative to the Board. We would like to thank Susannah Leydon-Davis for being the inaugural Athlete Representative to the Board and it was fantastic to see her appointment to the Badminton Oceania Athletes Commission that compliments her role with our organisation.

Leading up to the 2018 AGM, the Board followed the procedures set out in our newly updated Constitution for the Board appointment process. The Board Appointments Panel interviewed several high-quality applicants for the Appointed Board member vacancy, and former Olympic badminton player John Moody was appointed to fill the vacancy left by Mary Gardiner's resignation. Mary made a significant contribution to the work of the board redrafting the Constitution and we thank her for her energy and commitment.

I would also like to thank President Ian Willans and the very dedicated Board for their time and commitment to improving outcomes for badminton in New Zealand. We are fortunate to have an excellent mix of governance skills and knowledge of badminton around the board table. It is an honour and a privilege to serve alongside such a knowledgeable and dedicated group of people.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

JOE HITCHCOCK

I am pleased to report on the significant achievements for Badminton New Zealand across our strategic priorities in 2018. It has been a productive year with a number of new or enhanced initiatives taking shape and delivering increased value to our badminton community. We continue to build on our mission of inspiring kiwis to love badminton for life through building stronger badminton communities, getting more people playing badminton and striving for better badminton performances. We would not be able to achieve this progress without the support of our valued partners and stakeholders.

Last year saw significant progress in building stronger badminton communities through the work of our twenty-five Associations and a number of key community partners. Increasing the capability and capacity of organisations ensures participants access the best possible badminton experiences. We now have a record number of paid employees in the badminton workforce around New Zealand and the work being achieved can be seen in the growing participation rates and increased quality of programmes and events. More and more Associations are looking at ways in which to improve not only their services, but their governance and strategy. This is a critical component in continuing to adapt to the changing needs of participants and the changing way sport is delivered and consumed. Partnering with Sport New Zealand to deliver the 'Voice of Participant' survey has been an important yardstick to measure increased effectiveness and satisfaction and it is fantastic to see many Associations making improvements through these results.

Badminton continues to boom with increasing demand for opportunities. We are fortunate to be in this position as a number of sports in New Zealand decline in participation numbers. It is fantastic to see the increase reflected through Shuttle Time as our foundation national programme for learning badminton that experienced 38% growth in the last twelve months. This has translated into record entries in badminton at the AIMS Games, the New Zealand Secondary School Badminton Championships and the New Zealand Junior Team Badminton Championships. As more and more kiwis are inspired to participate in badminton it is important that we ensure a strong pathway is in place to encourage opportunities at every level. In this we are proud of the steps we are taking to lead and deliver more in the emerging Para Badminton space and it has been great to see our Associations embrace this.

Events and competitions remain an important part of the work we do in getting more kiwis playing more badminton. At the highest level our Barfoot & Thompson New Zealand Badminton Open achieved its best year yet with sell out crowds and a legend of badminton, Lin Dan, competing here for the first time in front of thousands of fans. A special thank you to Event Director Julie Carrel who has built this event from the ground up over more than a decade. Julie finished her time with Badminton New Zealand in 2018 and we would like to express our

gratitude for the huge amount she has achieved in her time working with the organisation. In 2018 we took the success and learning from delivering world class international events and translated this to vastly improve the Wisden Cup Division 1 New Zealand Team Championships. An exciting new shorter format combined with live SKY Sport coverage reinvigorated the event that saw New Zealand players on kiwi TV screens for the first time in many years. We continue to work on developing this event to ensure it provides the best opportunity for Associations to show their provincial pride and the exciting skills of our kiwi players.

With increasing numbers of kiwis playing badminton every day, Badminton New Zealand also strives to ensure that high quality experiences are being delivered. Our strategic priority of better badminton performance aims to achieve high quality outcomes on and off the court that will make Kiwis proud. It has been fantastic to welcome our Performance Manager and National Coach Rikke Olsen Siegemund and her family to New Zealand in 2018. We are fortunate to have Rikke's experience and expertise guiding our performance programme forward. This will be a long-term process, but we are excited by the performances and results New Zealand players continue to achieve and build on. Our junior performance programme continues to grow in strength and we greatly appreciate the number of coaches and Associations that give their time and knowledge to support this. Oscar Guo, who has been part of the junior performance programme for the last four years achieved the fantastic result of a Silver Medal at the Youth Olympic Games - a highlight for the year.

The 2018 year ended on a historic high with New Zealand successfully bidding for the hosting rights of the BWF World Junior Championships in 2020 and the BWF World Senior Championships in 2025. This speaks to the capability of our organisation and the international reputation we have for delivering high quality experiences. Badminton New Zealand President Ian Willans was instrumental in the bid process through his passion to host the world here in New Zealand. This is just one reflection of the huge level of contribution that Ian makes to Badminton New Zealand at all levels – from grassroots events to international presentations.

I would like to thank a long list of contributors to the work and success of Badminton New Zealand in 2018. Hetty Van Hale our Badminton New Zealand Board Chair and the entire Board for their continued investment of time in the sound governance and future focus of the organisation. Our partners, funders and stakeholders that empower Badminton New Zealand to have the resources and opportunities to make an impact in kiwi communities. This includes Sport New Zealand, the Badminton World Federation, Badminton Oceania, the New Zealand Olympic Committee, Paralympics New Zealand, Barfoot & Thompson, Massey University, YONEX, our New Zealand Badminton Open sponsors and the gaming trust funders. I would like to make special mention of the exceptional staff of Badminton New Zealand who go above and beyond in their contributions to the organisation and what we are trying to achieve. We are excited about the year ahead and look forward to continuing our work in inspiring kiwis to love badminton for life.



PROGRAMME DEVELOPMENT

SHUTTLE TIME

The Shuttle Time programme is becoming a more established and developed programme within our Associations, clubs and schools. This has resulted in a significant increase in Shuttle Time delivery in 2018 in comparison to 2017.

In 2018, 19 Associations in partnership with clubs and schools delivered Shuttle Time to:

- 46,229 Participants
- 23,511 male participants, 22,722 female participants

In 2017, 19 Associations in partnership with clubs and schools delivered Shuttle Time to:

- 33,481 Participants
- 17,360 male participants, 16,242 female participants

What is also pleasing to see is that the number of sessions each participant is experiencing has risen to 3.9. This indicates that the individual participant is receiving a greater Shuttle Time experience and a more in-depth introduction to badminton.

An important component to ensuring the quality delivery of the Shuttle Time programme is the ongoing development of Shuttle Time Tutors, Teacher/Coaches and Leaders. Again in 2018 in comparison to 2017, there was an increase in the number of people trained to deliver the Shuttle Time Programme. In 2017, 92 Teachers/Coaches and Leaders were trained in Shuttle Time whilst three Shuttle Time Tutors were trained.

In 2018 a total of 204 Teachers/Coaches and Leaders were trained in Shuttle Time:

- 10 Shuttle Time Tutors trained
- 108 Teachers/Coaches trained
- 96 Youth Leaders trained

The Shuttle Time Volunteer of the Month was continued, recognising 7 volunteers from 7 different regions:

Thank you to all our volunteers for their invaluable contribution to making Shuttle Time happen in their local Associations and communities.

Badminton New Zealand in 2018 was invited by the BWF to submit a best practice case study based on successfully piloting the BWF Shuttle Time Youth Leadership Award. This opportunity allowed us to review current programme delivery and to implement the following changes to the current delivery model; Badminton New Zealand have now included a Student Youth Leadership Log as a compulsory component to the completion of the award. The students are now certified once they have been placed into a Shuttle Time programme and delivered some Shuttle Time sessions under the guidance of a qualified Shuttle Time mentor. This is to ensure that the new student leaders are fully supported at the beginning of their coaching journey and that they are involved in a positive coaching experience. This will hopefully in turn see them continue on the coaching pathway.

Overall 2018 Shuttle Time delivery was a great success not only because of the high delivery numbers but because of the people behind the delivery. Thank you to all the Development Officers and Shuttle Time Coordinators within the Associations that are driving Shuttle Time and striving to deliver positive experiences to ensure that kiwi kids fall in love with the game.

Badminton New Zealand would also like to acknowledge and thank our Associations, Badminton Oceania and the BWF for their continued support in the delivery of Shuttle Time.

COACH EDUCATION

BWF LEVEL 1:

An important component of having more people playing badminton is to ensure there are more active coaches being developed who in turn are delivering high-quality experiences for participants. The BWF Level 1 Coach Education Course is Badminton New Zealand's platform to develop identified Association coaches to deliver quality experiences for players.

In 2018 one BWF Level 1 Course was delivered over two weekends in Auckland. 19 participants registered and undertook the BWF Level 1 Course. Of those who registered - 15 people passed, one person received a provisional pass and three people have been asked to re-sit the course in 2019.

BWF LEVEL 2 AND BWF LEVEL 1 TUTOR COURSES:

The BWF Coach Education Level 2 is an Advanced Coaching Award, catering for Badminton Coaches with an interest in Planning and Delivering. The course consists of 11 modules – outlining the Coaching Principles of:

- What to Coach – explaining the technical, tactical, and physical elements.
- How to Coach – defining the elements of coaching methodology.
- Planning and Delivery of a training programme.

Seven successful applicants undertook the week-long intensive course with all applicants successful in attaining the award.

In 2018 four people had the opportunity to become a BWF Level 1 Tutor which allows them, in partnership with Badminton New Zealand to deliver BWF Level 1 Courses. All four participants successfully obtained this qualification.

REGIONAL PLAYER/COACH DEVELOPMENT CAMPS:

In 2018 Badminton New Zealand organised for several coach and player development opportunities to be delivered in the regions to ensure that more areas could access national performance personnel and programmes. The focus of these sessions was to provide professional development for coaches whilst utilising the players and in turn the players received some top-level tips for improving their game. This also empowers our coaches with knowledge that allows the regions to develop high quality sustainable programmes.

The following professional development opportunities were delivered:

- Southern Region – 12 Coaches attended.
- Central Region – 11 Coaches attended.
- Bay of Plenty – 9 Coaches attended.

National Coach & Performance Manager Rikke Olsen Siegemund also delivered coach upskilling sessions at the New Zealand National Junior Teams Championships in Palmerston North. Two Coach Education Sessions were held, focussing on Ages & Stages development with 32 people attending in total.

PARA BADMINTON:

Badminton New Zealand continues to make inroads into developing Para Badminton. In 2018 Badminton New Zealand worked with Badminton Hawke's Bay and Badminton North Harbour to develop and deliver Open Days:

- A Hawke's Bay Open Day was held with 7 People attending.
- Badminton North Harbour delivered an opportunity at the Little People New Zealand Conference where 32 short stature participants attended.
- Badminton New Zealand also attended the Halberg Disability Games and delivered Shuttle Time to 33 participants.

Badminton New Zealand has managed to secure Halberg No Exceptions Investment funding which in 2019 will see Association Development Officers trained in understanding how to plan and deliver Para Badminton through the Shuttle Time Programme. The purpose of this training is to develop Para Badminton nationally as an integrated programme.

Badminton New Zealand continued to support Waikato Badminton Association Para Badminton athlete Corrie Robinson in attending three Para Badminton Internationals; the Japan Para Badminton International and the Australian and Oceania Para Badminton Championships. At the Oceania Championships Corrie had some impressive results with gold medals in the singles and mixed doubles combined SL3 & SL4 classifications.

Badminton Hawke's Bays Guy Harrison and Ben Hassleman also attended the Oceania Para Badminton Championships where they became classified - Guy in the SL3 category and Ben in the WH2 category. Both were successful in their first tournaments with Guy taking a bronze medal in the singles of the SL3 & SL4 classification and Ben also taking a bronze medal in the singles of the WH2 classification.

Badminton New Zealand continued to develop its relationship with Paralympics New Zealand with one coach, one administrator and one player being invited to attend a Paralympics Development Camp in October 2018. The attendees gained insight into how other Para athletes, coaches and administrators were operating which was an invaluable experience.

Badminton New Zealand would again like to thank Badminton Oceania for their support in helping us develop this programme area.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

The Badminton New Zealand U15 and U19 performance programmes were again delivered to a high standard with plenty of opportunities provided for squad members to develop. Below are the lists of the 2018 squads and the opportunities that they received.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

A real focus on stronger badminton communities in 2018 saw an increase in meaningful activity that has set a solid foundation for the continue growth of badminton across the country. Our partnership with the twenty-five member Associations has been critical to the achievements in this space and we thank them for their openness to embrace opportunities and challenges. By building capability and capacity at the grassroots level, badminton communities will have the expertise and resources to meet the growing demand for badminton from the public.

A key piece to working within communities is asking them about their experiences, listening to their stories and understanding what their feedback means to badminton and how we can use it to improve. Partnering with Sport New Zealand and Nielsen Research with the 'Voice of the Participant' survey for the second year has enabled Badminton New Zealand to access important insights. Badminton New Zealand also invested further into regional breakdowns of the survey data that helps Associations with targeted and specific information. The major themes of the national data include:

- Badminton had increasing positive scores across all key metrics from 2017 to 2018. This includes overall satisfaction with the participant's experience with badminton, net promoter score, value for money, likelihood to re-join and the joining process.
- Participants were least satisfied with facilities and access to facilities.
- If more investment was available, participants would request further player development programmes and increased facilities and access to facilities.

Paid workforce in the badminton community around New Zealand continued to grow with the addition of Community Development Officers around the country. This has provided a great opportunity to come together regularly to share best practice, access professional development opportunities and to work together on common challenges and opportunities. People make or break the success of badminton in a community and in a region. It has been fantastic to work with a passionate group of people (both paid and voluntary) who are working hard to ensure their Association and its programmes and events are successful. Badminton New Zealand have also looked to engage and empower the Northern, Central and Mainland clusters and through workforce development create a stronger platform for these collectives.

Governance at a regional level remains an important component of the effectiveness in Associations and all community organisations. Badminton New Zealand continued its work with Associations and their committee or board structures to support, where we can, an increase in capability. Several Associations undertook the opportunity to develop strategic plans and review their current constitutions in partnership with Badminton New Zealand. This included

for the first time the concept of an Auckland Region strategic plan for badminton and with the help of Aktive this project is taking significant steps forward. It is likely that a document will be agreed upon in 2019 that will see the four Auckland region Associations working together on common goals that will open further doors to increased opportunities.

Late 2018 unfortunately saw the departure of Badminton New Zealand Community Manager Chris McIvor. Chris had been with the organisation for nearly two years and in this time made a significant difference in building the capability and capacity through strong relationships. Chris leaves to take up a regional leadership position in basketball and we wish him all the best on this new challenge. The community space for Badminton New Zealand remains a key priority and this is heightened with the inclusion of Shuttle Time into this portfolio in 2019.



EVENTS

SAM PATERSON

The 2018 season was an exciting year for badminton events, with a fast start to the season as the YONEX North Harbour International was quickly followed by the VICTOR Oceania Championships. Southland hosted the Australasian U17 June Bevan carnival, then the season took a record-breaking turn as Eastland joined 16 other associations at the YONEX NZ Junior Team Championships for the first time in over a decade, with the players combining to set a new world record for the most participants in a single rally.

The Wisden Cup further cemented its position as the most prized trophy in New Zealand badminton, as Tui Medical Waikato upset the more fancied Harcourts Cooper and Co. North Harbour in the televised final. School badminton continues to grow with over 500 players competing across three events in the last quarter of the year. The reputation of New Zealand as a hub for high-quality badminton events was further underlined by the awarding of the BWF World Junior Championships 2020 and BWF World Senior Championships 2025.

The BARFOOT & THOMPSON New Zealand Open broke new ground in 2018 as record crowds flocked to the North Shore Events Centre for the opportunity to watch Chinese superstar Lin Dan compete in New Zealand for the first time. Lin did not disappoint, with the sell-out Sunday crowd roaring as their idol claimed the Men's Singles title. While Lin was a sure fan favourite, the quality of the entire field with 34 players or pairs ranked within the world's top 30, proved the true highlight. In addition to an impressive array of playing talent, 2018 also marked the first year of the newly restructured HSBC BWF World Tour, with the Open gaining the status of a Super 300 event and with it a prize purse of USD\$150,000. The event continues a strong global reach with 120 hours of content broadcast to 45 million households in 11 countries. In addition, the event's YouTube page streamed content to over a million fans across the first five days of the event.

The schools' space has been an area of continued growth for badminton in New Zealand as Associations inspire our youngest players through high-quality secondary school and intermediate competitions. The continued focus on quality delivery resulted in badminton having the strongest growth (4%) of the top 10 sports in secondary schools. This is reflected in a 120% and 193% 5-year increase in the NZ Secondary School Championships and AIMS Games (delivered by Badminton Bay of Plenty), respectively. As Badminton New Zealand looks to 2019, we are excited to deliver the combined YONEX New Zealand Secondary School and Tertiary Championships, the first event of its kind in New Zealand. The combined event aims to highlight the continued playing opportunities available for all students as they transition into their tertiary lives.

To close, we would like to offer a congratulations to all Associations who have enhanced their participant focused delivery, with positive high-quality experiences being recognised by all those involved. We would also like to thank our technical officials, volunteers, sponsors and partners who together assist us in our mission to inspire kiwi's to love badminton for life.

TECHNICAL OFFICIALS

2018. Another busy year for Technical Officials. We started the year with the Oceania Open Championships and the Oceania Mens and Womens Team Championships held at North Harbour and followed it up with the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast at the beginning of April. We continued to build on the legacy of the World Masters Games held in 2017 and were able to encourage many of those who officiated there to continue on and join us at the many National events held.

This group of people is often under-valued by the people they come in contact with but both Badminton New Zealand and the NZ Technical Officials Committee recognise the massive amount of work undertaken by them and very much appreciate this.

The Technical Officials Committee consists of a group of people who cover all regions of New Zealand and also all aspects of officiating – they are Lynne Nixey (Referee, Northern), Trish Gubb (Umpire, Northern), Dorothy Callister (Referee/Umpire, Northern), Greg Pitcher (Umpire, Northern), Julie Carrel (Referee/Event Management, Northern), Greg Busch (Line Judge/Umpire, Central), and Richard Bramley (Umpire, Southern) – thanks to them once again for their assistance over the year. Whilst I am often seen as the ‘face’ of the Technical Officials, without a team behind me I would be unable to ensure the ongoing training / assessing and upskilling of our Officials.

I hope to see more people attending Technical Officials Courses when these are taking place. NZ Technical Officials can train your Officials at the highest level, however we sometimes are unable to find the people to put on the courses – that comes back to the Associations support. Hopefully we will see an increase of numbers attending courses during the forthcoming year with further proactive support regionally.

Seniors Division One and Two – Wisden and Slazenger Cups

This was held at Auckland this year in the new format. Still 6 teams per Division.

Instead of 1 x pool of 6, there was 2 x pools of 3 then a Knockout.

Instead of 16 matches, Wisden only played 5 matches – 1 of each discipline and Slazenger played 11 matches.

Tui Medical Waikato 1 won the Wisden Cup this year after being 2nd last year. Canterbury 1 were outplayed in all ties but remain in Wisden for 2019 due to the one team per Association rule.

In Slazenger, Shirley Rental Waitakere 2 won Slazenger but remain in Slazenger for 2019 as Waitakere already have a team in Wisden. Otago 1 lost in the play off for 5th/6th, however they remain in Slazenger for 2019, as Slazenger has been increased to 8 teams.

Seniors Division Three – New Zealand Final

Harcourts Cooper and Co. North Harbour 3 defeated Canterbury 2 to win the NZ Seniors Division 3. Both teams are promoted to Slazenger for 2019, as Slazenger has been increased to 8 teams.

Seniors North Island Division 3 and 4

Each played as a pool of 9 teams – 2 ties each over 4 weekends.

Waitakere 3 will remain in Division 3 due to no team being relegated from Slazenger Cup in 2018.

Seniors North Island Division Five

This increased to 8 teams this year, so only 1 round was played giving each team 7 ties.

Seniors South Island Division 3

Remained at 6 teams this year. Canterbury 2 won this division after being 2nd in 2017. Although they lost the NZ Div 3 Final, they are promoted to Slazenger, now that Slazenger has been increased to 8 teams.

Masters and Veterans North and South Island

Still the most popular categories with no major issues. Masters North Island Divisions 1 to 4 each played as a pool of 9 teams. Masters North Island Division 5 was played as 1 x pool of 6 – each team played 5 ties over 3 weekends.

Veterans North Island Divisions 1 to 3 each played as a pool of 9 teams. Veterans North Island Division 4 had 6 teams playing 5 ties in Zone A and 6 teams playing 5 ties in Zone B with play offs. The top 2 teams in each Zone attended the play offs.

Masters South Island – all 3 x Divisions played as a pool of 6 teams.

Veterans South Island – all 3 x Divisions played as a pool of 4 teams.

North Island Super Veterans

Division 1 had 7 teams and played 1 round of 6 ties over 3 weekends. Division 2 had 9 teams and played 8 ties over 4 weekends.

Team entries for 2019

Overall, the team entry numbers have increased by four. Two more in Senior North Island, Masters North Island remain at 42, one less in Veterans North Island and three more in Super Veterans.

The Senior North Island Division 5 has increased to nine teams (up from 8), so get eight ties each.

Masters North Island Division 5 remains at six teams – with five ties each.

Veterans North Island Division 4 (11 teams) is split into Northern Zone of six teams and Southern Zone of five teams. Top four teams from both Zones progress to the play offs.

Super Vets Division 1 increases to nine teams – each playing eight ties over four weekends. Super Vets Division 2 increases to ten teams. This is split into Northern Zone of five teams and Southern Zone of five teams. Top four teams from both Zones progress to the play offs.

HIGH PERFORMANCE

RIKKE OLSEN SIEGEMUND

It has been a very busy year for our Badminton New Zealand High Performance Programme with a number of players, coaches and assistants taking advantage of the numerous opportunities offered to them both locally and internationally. It has been a year where we have tried to continue the work that was already established for the juniors, so our new National Coach & Performance Manager Rikke Olsen Siegemund, could get an understanding of how it's currently working and take into consideration what is the next step in the programme and what changes we are looking for in 2019. We have put a lot of time and effort into the NZ National Squad/ NZ Development Squad programmes. We have found this part really important for the future of Badminton New Zealand, so that the juniors we are working with can see there is a clear pathway for them to become a successful international badminton player.

New Zealand National Squad

We started 2018 with two weekly Squad trainings (Friday evenings and Saturday mornings) at Massey University and when Rikke started her position on the 15th of February we added 2 regular morning trainings (Tuesdays & Thursdays) from 6-8am at Auckland Badminton. In October we added two morning trainings (Monday & Fridays) from 6-8am, one at Massey and Friday morning at Auckland Badminton. Currently we have a group of 18 athletes, with most of them attending all trainings and all players being monitored with their own development goals & result goals. The programme is working with different periods (basic/pre competition/post competition and recovery) and is building on long term development, where we encourage the players to be the best they can and trust the process.

We've been lucky to have support from Brent Miller over the first few months, and recently Henry Tam has also invested time and effort into our athletes.

We finished the year off by finalising an agreement with Massey University so in 2019 the NZNS/ NZDS will have most of their trainings at Massey, along with access to their gym and associated expertise, as well as support around nutrition and sports psychology. This hopefully will be a big step in the right direction and will help to bring the programme to the next level.

The Badminton New Zealand National Squad achieved the following results in 2018:

- 16 athletes selected to participate in the Oceania Championships in Waikato and qualification for Thomas/ Uber Cup.
- Thomas Cup Team finished 2nd, losing 3-2 to Australia in the final.
- Uber Cup Team finished 2nd, losing 3-2 to Australia in the final.
- Abhinav Manota won gold in Men's Singles of the Oceania Championships and represented New Zealand at the BWF World Championships.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Badminton New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 31 December 2018

1. Reporting Entity

New Zealand Badminton Federation Inc is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is subject to the provisions of the Act. The financial statements are a special purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies below.

These financial statements have not been prepared for external use. They are prepared for governance purposes only and should not be relied on for any other purpose.

The comparative figures provided in the financial statements are for the year ended 31 December 2017.

2. Statement of Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Measurement Base

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis.

Grants (including Sport New Zealand) and sponsorship are recognised when the conditions attached to the grants have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions. Until any such obligations have been met, any grants or sponsorship received in cash are shown as income in advance.

Membership Levies are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Entry Fees (including New Zealand Open) and Player Contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined on a first-in-first-out basis, and net realisable value.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of fixed assets is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

Depreciation

Fixed assets are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

Employee Entitlements

Provision has been made for the organisation's liability for annual leave. The annual leave has been calculated on an actual entitlement basis at current rates of pay. This equates to the cash amount necessary to settle the obligation as at balance date.

Income Tax

The organisation is an amateur sports promoter and is exempt from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and Services Tax

All amounts are stated exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

THE BOARD'S FOCUS

The board focuses on the organisation's three strategic pillars – stronger badminton communities (capability), more people engaged with badminton (growth), and better badminton performances (quality). We implement strategy, monitor and measure our progress towards these broad strategic goals, identify and manage risks that face the organisation, and develop policy.

Priorities in 2018 included:

- Reviewing the strategic plan to 2020
- Improving risk oversight
- Improving governance policies and documentation as part of the Sport NZ Governance Mark process
- Improving budgeting and financial reporting
- Providing opportunities for governance education and relationship building within the sporting sector.

BOARD COMPOSITION

The board is comprised of four elected members (one of whom is the President) and three appointed members.

Prior to appointing new board members, a skills matrix of existing board member skills and experience is created to highlight any skills and experience that may be missing from the board. This informs the Board Appointments Panel (BAP) on the specific skills to look for when recruiting.

The BAP for the 2018 board appointment process comprised Hetty Van Hale (Badminton NZ Chair), Hilary Poole (Sport NZ Board Member), and Ant Carter (Managing Director, Lateral Leadership). There was one appointed position available following the resignation of Mary Gardiner and the BAP appointed John Moody (former badminton Olympic player) in her place.

COST OF GOVERNANCE

Board related costs for 2018 were \$10,769 which was predominantly for airfares and accommodation. Face-to-face meetings are considered very important to the board and the board has a geographic spread that covers a large part of New Zealand so meetings are held in several locations including Auckland, Wellington and Queenstown.

In order to keep costs down, generally every second meeting is by teleconference and meetings are combined with major events such as the NZ Badminton Open and the Annual General Meeting.
