# GOVERNANCE REPORT

RAVI NYAYAPATI

It remains an honour to serve as Chair of Badminton New Zealand and to lead the governance of our organisation over the past year.

I begin by acknowledging my fellow Board members for their commitment, insight, and willingness to contribute to the important work of governance. Serving on a volunteer board is never without challenge, particularly in a period of significant change. I am deeply grateful to my colleagues for the time, energy, and care they have given to ensuring that governance at Badminton New Zealand remains focused, effective, and in service of the game across New Zealand.

Over the past year, the Board has continued to strengthen its culture, practices, policies, and overall capability. We have worked actively to create a more structured operating rhythm, clearer committee responsibilities, stronger governance processes, and greater alignment around strategic outcomes. This reflects a broader commitment to lifting the quality of governance across the organisation. As part of that journey, the Board will commence the Sport New Zealand Governance Mark certification process from June this year.

This past year tested the stability and governance of our organisation in ways that were, at times, deeply uncomfortable. The Board faced significant external pressure, internal disruption, and leadership transition simultaneously. That we emerged with a stronger constitution, a wonderful strategy, and new executive leadership is a testament to the resolve of those committed to the long-term health of the sport. While the process was at times demanding, it has left us in a stronger place than where we began.

## Leadership and organisational transition

The 2025 year was one of significant transition for Badminton New Zealand. We farewelled Stephen Nelson as Chief Executive and thank him for his contribution to the sport during his tenure. The Board then appointed Jane Patterson as Acting Chief Executive, and from July to December she brought clarity, structure, and momentum to the operations of the organisation. We are grateful to Jane for the exemplary leadership she provided during that period. Her work created a strong platform for our new Chief Executive, Claire Hamilton, who commenced in February this year.

Claire has begun positively and is working well with the dedicated staff as we move into the next phase of implementation and growth. The Board is encouraged by the way she has approached the role and by the opportunity now before us to translate renewed governance and strategic direction into strong organisational delivery.

On behalf of the Board, I also extend my heartfelt thanks to the staff of Badminton New Zealand. Their resilience, professionalism, and loyalty through a particularly challenging 2025 have been outstanding. Their contribution is deeply appreciated. We said goodbye to Rikke Olsen Siegemund whose family chose to return to Europe. Rikke is acknowledged for her service and wonderful contribution to our performance programme.

## Strategy, constitution, and building the platform ahead

A major focus over the past year has been setting the long-term direction of the organisation while restoring stability in a year of substantial change. A year ago, we spoke of entering a new phase for Badminton New Zealand as we stood on the cusp of shaping a revised five-year strategy. That process invited input from across our badminton community and wider stakeholders. We accommodated the many views, aspirations, and strongly held opinions about the future direction of our sport. As a result, the strategy took longer to finalise than originally anticipated. What began early in the year was ultimately completed in October. The outcome, however, was worth the time and effort invested. We now have a strategy that people believe in. It is one that provides a clear pathway for progress and success over the next five years. It gives our sport a shared sense of direction and a positive outlook for the future.

Alongside this, another major milestone was the revalidation of our constitution and the successful re-registration of Badminton New Zealand under the Incorporated Societies Act 2022. This was a significant achievement and one that ensures continuity, compliance, and confidence in the organisation's governance framework.

With a renewed constitution in place, a new five-year strategy agreed, and new executive leadership established, the Board is now firmly focused on the next stage: working alongside the Chief Executive to operationalise that strategy over the coming years. That work is already underway.

Where we now stand is a strong foundation on which to take badminton further. The sport may look back fondly on its glory days from several years ago, but our responsibility is not simply to admire the past. It is to build the future. Foundational elements such as a clear strategy, a modern constitution, a new Chief Executive, and a Board committed to strong governance are not abstract achievements. They are the launchpad for sustainable growth. We should embrace this moment and move ahead with confidence to achieve the outcomes set out in the strategy.

## Financial sustainability and future resilience

As the conditions for funding become harder and more competitive, it is increasingly important that Badminton New Zealand strengthens its own financial capability. We must build on our ability to generate revenue through commercial partnerships, fundraising, and other sustainable revenue streams. For this to happen, good and stable governance, and excellent management practices are fundamental. This is one of the Board's core priorities for the period ahead.

Financial sustainability is an essential enabler for this. If we are to create a future that is both ambitious and achievable, we must ensure the organisation is resilient, credible, and capable of growing its own strength over time. We ask the wider badminton community to come on this journey with us so that the future of our sport is bright, sustainable, and increasingly self-determined.

## Stakeholder support and the role of volunteers

Badminton New Zealand has been fortunate to continue receiving the support of a number of key organisations and partners. In particular, I want to acknowledge Sport New Zealand,



whose support and understanding were invaluable during a challenging time for the Board, management, and our wider membership. Their backing helped the organisation stabilise, realign, and move forward from a firmer foundation.

We also thank Badminton Oceania and the Badminton World Federation for their ongoing support and partnership. In addition, we acknowledge the New Zealand Olympic Committee and Paralympics New Zealand as valued stakeholders. We remain deeply appreciative of all our sponsors, funders, and grant providers, without whom our work would not be possible.

We particularly want to acknowledge those volunteers within our associations who continued to show up, organise and run competitions, support their communities, and maintain their commitment to the sport through a period of significant uncertainty at the national level. Your consistency is the backbone of this sport. At every level of badminton in New Zealand, volunteers give their time, energy, and heart so that others can play, compete, develop, and belong. That contribution deserves not only thanks, but genuine recognition for the stability it has provided during a difficult period.

**The Board and its work**

Kerrin Harrison, Simon Lin, Kelly Newsome, and Tony Pervan have continued their service since the last AGM. During the year, we saw the resignations of Lou Satherley in May and Alex Qi in August. I extend my thanks to both Lou and Alex for their contributions during their time on the Board. I also acknowledge Peter Beckerleg and Tash Bartlett, who stepped into casual vacancy roles through to the 2026 AGM.

\* Following the completion of the high-performance review in October last year, the Board resolved to disestablish this committee as the work transitions into operational delivery.

\*\* To support this work, the Board established an Advisory Group in December 2025, led by Peter Beckerleg and Kerrin Harrison, to bring strategic matters to associations and strengthen the feedback loop between the membership and the Board. Strengthening the effectiveness of this advisory group remains an area of continued focus for the Board.

**Board expenses**

Board expenses show a significant increase from 2024; however, these were largely contained at the bottom-line. The financial statements record total Board expenses of \$24,596.26. A significant portion of Board expenses in 2025 related to the governance processes necessitated by the Special General Meeting. The Board is grateful to Sport New Zealand for their support in covering these costs and is pleased to report that the matters which prompted that meeting have been fully resolved through proper process.

This Sport New Zealand support is reflected in “other grants” within the financial statements. As a result, the net Board expenditure for 2025, outside of the SGM, was \$10,657.13, which is broadly in line with prior years.

**Outlook**

The Board, alongside its regular governance responsibilities and oversight of the organisation, has provided major foundational outcomes in the past year. This is not a small body of work. It has required resilience, maturity, and a willingness to confront difficult issues directly. It has also required a belief that badminton in New Zealand is worth that effort. I believe strongly that it is.

With this conviction, the Board extends an open invitation to every Association, every volunteer, and every member of our community: come with us. What lies ahead is the work of building a sport that every New Zealander with a racket in their hand can be proud of. That work is more exciting, and more possible, than it has been in years. Let us build a better badminton future together.

We look ahead with confidence and optimism. The foundations are stronger, our direction is clearer, and our focus is firmly on delivery. The opportunity now is to build on that platform with discipline, unity, and ambition. If we do that well, the future for badminton in New Zealand can be both proud and sustainable.



# CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Tēnā koutou katoa

It is a privilege to present my first Chief Executive's Report at a time when badminton in New Zealand is demonstrating strong momentum, capability, and opportunity for continued growth.

## Organisational transition and acknowledgements

The past year has been one of transition at the national level, including changes in senior leadership and within the Board. Periods of change can place pressure on organisations, and I would like to sincerely acknowledge and thank the Badminton New Zealand staff for the professionalism, commitment, and care they have shown throughout this transition. Their dedication to the organisation and to the sport has ensured continuity of delivery and maintained momentum during a challenging period. We would like to provide a special acknowledgement to Donna Trow who reached her 10-year anniversary with the organisation in 2025.

We acknowledge the Board for its focus on stability, good governance, and long term stewardship of the sport. The revised Constitution and the establishment of a clear Statement of Strategic Direction provide a strong foundation from which management and Associations can move forward with confidence and shared intent.

We thank Stephen Nelson for the important work he has undertaken to support the ongoing growth, capability, and positioning of Badminton New Zealand. His contribution has helped the organisation continue to progress and remain focused on its long term objectives.

We wish to acknowledge Jane Patterson, who stepped into the role of Interim Chief Executive during 2025. Jane's leadership, professionalism, and calm stewardship provided continuity for the staff and ensured the effective ongoing administration of the sport during a critical transition period.

Badminton New Zealand remains grateful for the ongoing support of the Badminton Oceania Confederation (BOC) and the Badminton World Federation (BWF). In particular, we wish to acknowledge Julie for her continued engagement, guidance, and support of the organisation. We also acknowledge Glenn Cox as Vice President of BOC, a significant achievement that reflects both individual capability and New Zealand's contribution to the wider Oceania and international badminton community.

We also acknowledge Sport New Zealand, who have stood alongside the organisation throughout the transition period. Their counsel, advice, and financial support when required have been invaluable, and their continued partnership has provided both reassurance and constructive challenge during a complex time for the organisation.

We would like to recognise and celebrate the technical officials, volunteers, tournament officials, coaches, and team management personnel who underpin the success of badminton across both community and international settings. Their expertise, consistency, and commitment ensure competitions are delivered with integrity, fairness, and professionalism, supporting athletes at every stage of their journey, from grassroots participation to representing New Zealand on the global stage. Ongoing investment in their development is essential.

To our players, from grassroots through to international representation, thank you for your commitment to the game. The performances of our athletes at Oceania Championships and across national competitions reflect growing depth and capability, while the enthusiasm seen at local and community levels is a powerful indicator of badminton's appeal and accessibility. Your dedication inspires the wider badminton community and reinforces the value of continued investment in pathways and competition structures.

Of particular importance, we wish to recognise the contribution of each Association and the many volunteers who lead and support our sport. The commitment shown by those working within badminton is significant and sustained, and this dedication does not go unnoticed, thank you.

## Opportunity and Growth

We have a wonderful opportunity with badminton continuing to experience significant growth both globally and domestically. While this creates challenges, particularly in relation to facilities, capacity, and systems, it also presents an exciting opportunity to strengthen how the sport is delivered and supported nationwide.

Our national events programme continues to be a strong pillar for the sport. The scale and quality of delivery across tournaments reflects the dedication of Associations, event managers, volunteers, and officials. The growth seen across competitions highlights the strength of the participation pathway and the importance of coordinated national leadership to support that growth sustainably.

Commercially, the organisation remains grateful for the support of funding partners, councils, trusts, and commercial contributors who enable the delivery of programmes and events across the country. These partnerships are essential to sustaining and enhancing opportunities for players, officials, and volunteers, and we remain focused on building strong, transparent, and mutually beneficial relationships. We are actively working to grow badminton's share of available grant funding, while extending our revenue strategy to increase and diversify commercial partnerships across our delivery model.

Looking ahead, a key priority for the year is the commencement of the Member Management System (MMS) project, scheduled to begin following the AGM. This project is a critical enabler for the organisation and the wider network. It will strengthen data quality, improve reporting and visibility across participation and competition, and support better decision making. Importantly, it will also allow for a comprehensive and evidence based review of the current affiliation model, ensuring it is transparent, equitable, and aligned with participation realities.



Alongside this, following the Performance Review commenced in 2025, we are working to strengthen our performance programme through the development of a clear, fit for purpose framework that builds strong foundations and positions the pathway for long term success.

Progress in badminton depends on strong collaboration. By bringing together national leadership, regional insight, and community delivery, and building on the positive momentum across the sport, we are well positioned to strengthen alignment, support sustainable growth, and deliver positive experiences for everyone involved in badminton across Aotearoa New Zealand.



# PRESIDENT

It is with great pride that I continue to serve as your President and reflect on both the progress we have made and the opportunities that lie ahead for badminton in New Zealand.

Globally, badminton is experiencing remarkable growth. It is now one of the most watched sports at the Olympic Games, with increasing demand for international events across all regions of the world. This global momentum is being felt here in New Zealand, where we are seeing a significant rise in participation and demand for court access.

While this growth is incredibly encouraging, it also presents a challenge. Across the country, we are beginning to feel the pressure on court availability and infrastructure. Demand is, in many cases, outpacing supply. However, this is a challenge that represents opportunity.

We are sitting on the edge of something special. Badminton has the potential to become one of the most widely played and accessible sports in New Zealand. To achieve this, we must continue to ask ourselves a simple but powerful question: How do we make that happen?

The answer will require alignment across all levels of the game—national, regional, and community. It will require investment in facilities, development of coaching pathways, and a clear, shared vision for the future. Most importantly, it will require all of us working together with intent and purpose.

## Celebrating Players

It was fantastic to see our teams compete at the Oceania Championships at North Harbour, which served as qualification for Thomas and Uber Cup finals later in the year. The standard of competition was exceptionally high, and while the results did not ultimately go our way, the margins were incredibly fine. With just a few moments going differently, we could easily have been preparing for the Championship Finals in Denmark.

The performance of our players demonstrated the growing strength and depth of badminton in New Zealand. It is clear that we are developing athletes capable of competing at the highest level, and this should give us great confidence for the future.

Beyond the elite level, we are also witnessing strong growth across all grades of the game. There has been a noticeable increase in tournaments that cater to a wide range of playing levels, reflecting a broader and more inclusive participation base.

This presents a significant opportunity. The enthusiasm and enjoyment we are seeing at grassroots and competitive levels must be harnessed. By creating a more connected, nationally led tournament environment, we have the potential to significantly increase participation and strengthen the overall structure of the game.

## Acknowledging Our Leaders and Supporters

It is no secret that the past 12 months have been a challenging period for badminton at the national level. The management team has worked under considerable pressure, particularly with the financial constraints we have faced, and the Board itself has experienced a level of change that has impacted overall stability.

Despite this, there is a strong sense that we are now moving forward with greater clarity. Stability is essential, and just as important is a shared vision—one that unites us all as we work toward the future of badminton in New Zealand.

We are beginning to see the opportunity that lies ahead. The value badminton can bring to our wider community, our associations, and players at every level is significant. If we remain aligned in our belief and committed to what we are building, we have a real opportunity to capitalise on the current momentum.

That said, challenges remain. Securing sustainable funding, increasing visibility, and ensuring badminton has a strong and recognised voice within New Zealand's sporting landscape will continue to require focus and collective effort.

## The Board's Commitment

The past year has brought considerable change to the Board. However, I am confident that we are now entering a period where a more consistent and aligned group will lead the organisation forward.

Throughout this period of transition, the Board has remained strong in its governance responsibilities. There has been a clear focus on ensuring robust processes, forward-looking decisions, and the protection of badminton's long-term interests.

Importantly, we have made meaningful progress. A revised constitution has been achieved, a clear strategic plan is now in place to guide the new CEO and management team, and there is a shared vision that provides direction for the future.

## Looking Ahead

Badminton in New Zealand has a unique and exciting opportunity ahead. The challenge now is to bring all elements of the sport together in a way that allows us to fully realise this potential.

The path forward will not be simple. There will be differing views, alternative ideas, and multiple pathways proposed. This is natural in a sport that is growing and evolving.

However, I firmly believe that badminton in New Zealand will come together. Through collaboration between associations, alignment with the Board, CEO, and the wider badminton community, we can move forward step by step toward meaningful progress.

# PROGRAMMES

DONNA TROW, TRACEY HALLAM, MARTIN ANDREW

During 2025/26, New Zealand delivered nine Shuttle Time courses—an increase of two from the previous year. These courses are now financially supported by Badminton Oceania, provided they meet participation and female representation requirements.

Over the same period, Associations also expanded their workforce through Youth Leadership and Teacher courses. This resulted in an additional 15 Youth Leaders (5 female) and 66 Shuttle Time Teachers (26 female) nationally.

There is a growing need to strengthen female representation across all BWF courses which Badminton New Zealand support and actively encourage more women onto the coaching pathway, particularly to support team requirements such as NZJTC.

## Shuttle Time Numbers

In 2025 a total of 32,120 participants engaged in Shuttle Time sessions. They consisted of 16,897 males and 15,245 females and 447 participants with disabilities. Whilst the overall number of participants were slightly less than the previous year the number of participant sessions was up to 269,309, which was an increase of 11,032 participant sessions.

A huge thank you to the Shuttle Time Workforce for spending time and working with the players to give them a chance to play for life.

## Formal BWF Qualifications

For BWF Level 1, 17 candidates started and 12 completed the course.

Successful coaches were: Philip Doerhn, Bryn Griffiths, Chakrit Liamsuksri, Donald Koh, Brian Wang, Stephen Bowden, Chris Benzie, and Jeff Chow.

These results highlighted the need to improve success rates, leading to the introduction of an informal upskilling initiative, Coach Lab, to better prepare and support candidates.

## Informal Coach Development opportunities.

Coach Lab was developed to address common areas of difficulty identified by tutors, alongside feedback from both successful and unsuccessful candidates over the past 2–4 years on what they wished they had known before undertaking the course.

To date, 79 coaches have attended, with delivery across Counties Manukau, Waikato (twice), Wellington North, Wellington, Canterbury, and Otago, and participation from coaches of neighbouring associations such as West Coast, Southland, Thames Valley, Hutt Valley, Bay of Plenty and Eastland.

The programme focuses on session observation and improvement, the IDEAS model, planning for different learning styles, and decision-making around “what to practice,” while also outlining course expectations. It helps coaches better understand their readiness for formal qualifications.

## Player and Coach Development

Badminton New Zealand led various player development initiatives, reaching 88 players from 13 Associations through targeted programmes:

- 48 players participated in the U15 Northern Region Development Camp, representing five northern Associations, as well as Canterbury, Wellington, Wellington North, and Hutt Valley.
- 20 players attended the Central Region Development Day from five Associations.
- 20 players joined the Mainland Region Development Day from two Associations.
- As before some players attended both their regional camp and the Northern Region camp due to their skill level

The Regional Coach Advanced Programme further expanded exposure to Badminton New Zealand themes, with U17 players also engaging more deeply with these concepts.

New Zealand also partnered with Australia to provide an international opportunity for U15 players. Following the NZBL, 12 players were selected to travel to Australia in June, where they experienced overseas competition, training, and an international tie, supported by two coaches.

Coach development continued through the Regional Coach Advanced Programme, with 15 coaches and 36 players from 11 Associations involved in 2025. This year the programme expanded to include final-year U17 players, further strengthening alignment with BNZ development themes. What came out of this is that coaches need to remember that the players are their focus and they have a duty to be organised and plan to provide the players with quality sessions and to present these sessions well to the players. The coaches did express an interest to be aligned with language and themes which Badminton New Zealand deliver so that it made it easier for the players.

Internationally, Amy Wang (NH) and Lucas Qin (WKO) were selected to compete in an U16 singles event in Shonai, Japan.

## Coach Development Tool

Work is ongoing with Canterbury to develop an online session aimed at supporting their coaches. In Waikato, plans are also progressing for a face-to-face workshop focused on using effective questioning techniques to encourage player problem-solving during breaks.

At the end of 2025, we also began collaborating with Badminton Otago and Counties Manukau, with initial work focused on assessing and confirming their current coaching capacity

## Balance is Better

Badminton New Zealand remains committed to a “Balance is Better” philosophy - working collaboratively as one system to deliver quality, consistent badminton experiences that attract and retain participants at every level of the game.



## Coach Accreditation – Raising the Standard

A key initiative in 2025 was the introduction of mandatory Association Accreditation for coaches operating on the back of the court at all U15, U17, and U19 sanctioned and national events.

To be accredited, coaches were required to:

- Complete the Coaching on the Back of the Court online module
- Sign and adhere to a Coaches Code of Ethics
- Be Police Vetted

This 60–90 minute online module, including an assessment component, ensured coaches had a clear understanding of expectations, behaviours, and athlete-centred coaching practices.

Impact:

Through the collation of the Rangatahi satisfaction survey at events it is evident that this initiative has already strengthened the quality and consistency of coaching environments, and is supporting safer and more positive experiences for young players.

## Balance is Better Advisory Group

Badminton New Zealand extends our sincere thanks to the Advisory Group for their expertise, robust discussion, and collaborative approach. Their guidance continues to play a vital role in ensuring quality experiences across all levels of badminton—from community participation through to performance pathways.

The young Kiwi team secured an impressive silver medal at the Victor Oceania Team Championships and also performed well in the individual competition, where Raphael Deloy (Waikato) and Lezhi Zhu (Hawke's Bay) produced a dominant performance to be crowned the Junior Men's Doubles Champions, defeating their Australian opponents in convincing fashion.

This campaign highlights the strength of our emerging talent and the effectiveness of our development pathways, with athletes stepping up and delivering on the international stage.

### U16 Shonai Invitational

New Zealand was again represented at the U16 Shonai Invitational in Japan by two emerging athletes and a coach.

Amy Wang (North Harbour) and Lucas Qin (Waikato) were selected to compete in this prestigious event, gaining exposure to a high-quality international field in what proved to be an exciting and memorable experience.

The tournament featured boys' and girls' singles, played in a round-robin format followed by knockout rounds. Both athletes benefited from valuable international match play, further supporting their development along the performance pathway.

Ken Yew (Waikato) accompanied the team as coach, providing guidance and support throughout the tour.

Badminton New Zealand extends its thanks to Badminton Oceania for facilitating this opportunity, which continues to play an important role in developing our future talent.



### U15 Australian Experience

In 2025, Badminton New Zealand proudly reintroduced the U15 Australian Experience, a key development initiative designed to provide young athletes with their first exposure to international touring, training, and competition.

A team of 12 athletes was selected to travel to Melbourne, Australia, where they participated in a comprehensive programme including joint training sessions with Australia, tournament match play, and a trans-Tasman test match.

## PERFORMANCE

2025 proved to be a period of change for some of New Zealand's top players. Some competed overseas much more regularly than they had previously and were able to compete in higher level tournaments, simply due to having higher world rankings. The experience gained from competing in the highly competitive world of international badminton tournaments cannot be understated, it should remain as a focus as we move forwards – players need to compete internationally for their level, and that of badminton in New Zealand, to improve.

Edward Lau and Shaunna Li were recipients of collaborative support from Badminton Oceania, Badminton New Zealand and Badminton North Harbour - this assisted them in competing in a higher number of tournaments, which in turn has further developed their competitive levels.

Other players were not able to compete in 10 tournaments which is the figure necessary to maximise their world ranking (best 10 results in a calendar year). Edward and Shaunna also qualified for and competed in the 2025 World Championships which took place in Paris, France.

In September 2025, Rikke Olsen Siegemund departed from her role as Performance Manager, additionally her Assistant Coach Oliver Leydon-Davis also finished his part-time role at the same time. Martin Andrew took over the role as Performance Manager in an interim capacity initially for 6 months, to ensure the programme continued with the senior players.

From September 2025, the primary focus with the Senior National Squad players and the additional Sparring group has been to strengthen the culture and togetherness within the programme. New Zealand has talented players, we need to challenge each other consistently to keep progressing and to move New Zealand back to higher levels in the sport.

### PARA BADMINTON – A Breakthrough Year

Para badminton in New Zealand continues to go from strength to strength, building on the momentum created by our first Paralympian, Wojtek Czyz.

In 2025, Badminton New Zealand—supported by Badminton Oceania—sent its largest-ever Para contingent to compete at both the VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships and the YONEX Australian Para Badminton International.

# EVENTS

JAMES VEITCH, ALEC HUANG

Reflecting on another season allows us to celebrate the successes whilst acknowledging the challenges. As part of our continued commitment to the Balance is Better philosophy and providing quality experiences, the 2025 season saw a review of previous changes and the piloting of changes to coaching at U15 sanctioned events aimed at building on the development of players from previous U13 changes and retaining more participants in badminton. A long-term project aimed at improving quality experiences, and adapting events to better meet participants needs also began this year, with the Rangatahi satisfaction survey providing insight into player experience across a range of national and sanctioned events.

Badminton North Harbour once again staged the MAXX North Harbour International in October, with 57 New Zealanders competing out of an overall entry of 188 players from 15 countries. We gratefully acknowledge the team, officials, volunteers, and Badminton Oceania for their continued dedication to host this important event.

The gratefully received gaming trust support for the NZ Tour allows us to financially support our host Associations to deliver a higher level of playing experience at these critical senior sanctioned events. This investment provides vital funds to both grow the number of, and develop the existing technical officials, which is necessary to continue raising the bar for future national and sanctioned event delivery across New Zealand.

Seventeen Associations delivered a total of 46 sanctioned events across the country. A big thank you for your efforts, especially for your support around the implementation of Balance is Better in your junior events. It is with this engagement that we strive to achieve a consistent and quality player experience within a competitive environment where players are appropriately challenged and supported.

Team events were very well attended once again in 2025, with the largest ever entry for the New Zealand Junior Team Championships in Palmerston North. The event witnessed a 12% increase in number of players over 2024, a total of 92 teams and 766 players. Strong growth in recent years has resulted in record participation in each of the past three years. The outcome of consultation with Associations earlier in the year saw the format for the U15 and U17 age groups change to a 12-match format to ensure that the event could accommodate the existing teams and continue to accommodate anticipated growth over the next few years.

We continue our valued partnership with University and Tertiary Sport New Zealand to deliver a quality New Zealand Tertiary Championships that meets the competitive needs of the range of tertiary students wanting to compete. In 2025, a combined invitational team from Epsom Girls Grammar School and Auckland Grammar School was invited to compete in the Championship event, exposing the secondary school students to the pathway for continued competition at tertiary level.

The New Zealand Secondary School Championships also saw significant growth for another year running, with a 17% increase in participants. The venue in Porirua is at capacity and 2026 will see the event run across two venues, and discussions have already begun with other sporting codes to move the event to higher capacity venues to allow for future growth from 2027 onwards. This is a credit to the work of associations in running secondary school leagues, in-school opportunities, and supporting school engagement.

Late 2024 saw James Veitch come on board as Events Manager to work with Alec Huang, with Jonathon Stone stepping back into the Commercial Manager role and supporting the delivery of streaming at key events.

A special thank you to each of our supporters this year, including Auckland Council local boards, Wellington City Council, Porirua City Council, Tauranga City Council, Christchurch City Council, Sport Manawatu, Dragon Community Trust, Grassroots Trust, Mainland Foundation, North and South Trust, NZCT, Pub Charity, Milestone Foundation, Aotearoa Gaming Trust, Kiwi Gaming Foundation, The Trusts Community Foundation, Bobby Foundation, and We Care Community Trust.

Finally, the biggest appreciation and thank you to each of our referees, umpires, line judges and volunteers who contributed throughout the year. Each of you are integral to helping us deliver high quality events to our community across the country. We look forward to working with you all again in 2026.



# TECHNICAL OFFICIALS

SIMON LIN

Following the successful trial run of online umpire training in 2022, we delivered another online training for aspiring umpires in 2025. With a record-breaking (over 40) number of registrations for this training, we saw nine new umpires trained and assessed in 2025. A robust training framework was also put in place to better support training and assessment of umpires in 2024; having designated assessment opportunities utilising the NZ Tour and other NZ National events meant that, after completion of the online training, prospective umpires can apply to complete their assessment with certainty. This significantly strengthened our development pathway for umpires. This new training and assessment approach continued to uplift our umpire workforce capability throughout New Zealand in 2025.

Thanks to the support of Badminton Oceania and BWF, two referees and five umpires have benefited from the Badminton Oceania Technical Official Development Programme. The programme is designed to provide funding support and appointment opportunities for these identified technical officials to attend international tournaments both within and outside of the Oceania region.

# COMMERCIAL

JONATHON STONE

The 2025 season marked the second year of Badminton New Zealand's Commercial function following the organisational restructure introduced in November 2023. Encouraging progress was made across our commercial objectives, with further growth in gaming and council funding, driven largely by improved success rates across applications. Although the wider economic environment and recessionary pressures in New Zealand made sponsor acquisition particularly challenging, we were still able to secure new partnerships with both Howden Insurance and RSL and develop promising opportunities for the future. In addition, our retail and merchandise activities delivered positive results, providing another emerging revenue stream to support the sport.

Contestable funding through councils and gaming trusts was a continued success despite growing competition for funds in this space. An increase of 14% was achieved with the success rate for applications increasing from 44% to 57% in terms of funding granted versus applied for. These results indicate a growing capability in contestable funding, with more events, programmes and operating costs supported through a smaller number of carefully crafted and targeted applications. We greatly appreciate and thank all the gaming trusts and council partners who have supported Badminton New Zealand in the 2025 season.

We also acknowledge the ongoing support of Yonex, Suzuki and Paladin Sports NZ towards our events and programmes throughout 2025. Our partnership with Paladin has delivered a range of benefits, with unique designs for our teams and a supply model that improves availability while reducing holding costs for team, official and staff uniform. We are delighted to welcome RSL as our Official Shuttlecock Partner for 2026 onwards, with two exciting co-branded shuttle models that will help deliver better value and contribute to a long-lasting legacy to badminton in New Zealand.

Alternative revenue streams grew substantially in 2025, with \$50k of revenue generated through equipment, merchandise and photo sales, including a successful print-on-demand supporters' shirt campaign that engaged the badminton community with minimal inventory risk. Betting commissions continued a slow but steady rise, reflecting the continued growth in badminton's popularity and an increase in the number of tournaments and options available through Entain's platforms.

These results reflect a deliberate strategy to diversify revenue streams and strengthen the financial sustainability of badminton in New Zealand. In 2026, I look forward to developing our relationships with gaming trusts, councils and sponsors further and optimising the value we receive from these important partners. Crucial to this will be developing a comprehensive member management system and collaborating with associations to highlight the scale, grassroots passion and performance achievements of badminton across New Zealand.



# Statement of Accounting Policies

## Badminton New Zealand For the year ended 31 December 2025

### Basis of Preparation

Badminton New Zealand Incorporated (Badminton NZ) has prepared the performance report in accordance with the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard issued by the External Reporting Board (XRB) on the basis that Badminton NZ does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses less than or equal to \$5,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

The Performance Report is presented in New Zealand dollars (NZ\$) and all values are rounded to the nearest NZ\$.

### Changes in Accounting Policies

Badminton NZ adopted the XRB's Tier 3 (NFP) Standard for the first time as at 1 January 2025, replacing the prior special purpose reporting framework. All changes have been applied retrospectively, as permitted by XRB transition requirements. All accounting policies were applied on a consistent basis for all periods presented in the performance report.

### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Badminton NZ is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

### Income Tax

Badminton NZ is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the Statement of Financial Position and Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash and bank balances (including short-term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised on an accrual basis, and is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

Grants (including Sport New Zealand) and sponsorship are recognised when the documented conditions attached to the grants or sponsorship have been met, and have been utilised in accordance with these conditions. Until any such obligations have been met, any grants or sponsorship received in cash are shown as deferred revenue.

Membership Levies are recognised over the period of the membership (usually 12 months). Amounts received in advance for memberships relating to future periods are recognised as a liability until such time that period covering the membership occurs.

Entry Fees and Player Levies and Other Event Income, are recognised in the period in which the respective event or competition takes place. Amounts received in advance of the event are recognised as a liability until such time that the event or competition occurs.

Player Contributions for development programmes are recognised in the period in which the programme takes place. Any amounts received in advance of the development programme occurring are recognised as a liability until such time that the programme takes place.

Goods and Services received in kind are not recorded as revenue or expense.

### Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

### Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in surplus or deficit in the year the asset is derecognised.

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated at rates which are anticipated to write them off over their estimated useful life. The rates used are:

### Holiday Pay Liability

Provision has been made for the liability for annual leave. The annual leave has been calculated on an actual entitlement basis at current rates of pay. This equates to the cash amount necessary to settle the obligation as at balance date.

### Restatement of Comparatives

This is the first year that Badminton NZ has prepared its performance report using the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard issued by the XRB. The performance report for the year ended 31 December 2024 was prepared on a different basis.

Consequently, the comparative information for the prior year has been restated to align with the measurement and recognition requirements of the new standard. The purpose of this restatement is to enhance the comparability of financial information between reporting periods.

As a result of reviewing the assets and liabilities at the beginning of the earliest comparative period, as required as part of the transition to the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard, it was determined that the funds received from Sport NZ in relation to the Member Management System initiative should be recognised as deferred revenue. The effect of this restatement was to recognise deferred revenue of \$240,000, as at 1 January 2024. As this amount had previously been recognised as revenue in a prior period, the corresponding restatement at 1 January 2024 was to reduce accumulated funds by \$240,000. This restatement therefore had no impact on the reported surplus or deficit for the years ending 31 December 2024 and 31 December 2025.
